1950-51 Budget Within Six Per Cent Limitation

Will Be Published Next Week; Hearing Set For August 21

The Malheur county court and budget board, meeting in Vale last Friday, re-drafted an earlier 1950-51 budget so as to bring it within the six per cent limitation and set Monday, August 21 as the date for a public hearing on the new budget.

The new budget and hearing, scheduled to open at 10 a. m., were made mandatory by changes effected in the figures after voters refused to authorize the county in two special elections to exceed the budget by \$87,500.

The budget board members, in effect, drafted an entirely new budget, which constitutes a permissible six per cent increase over the 1949-50 figure.

One of the first changes made was the elimination of the \$20,000 item for the courthouse sinking fund.

The county extension service fund was reduced from \$12,955 to \$4,500. The full-time health unit was discontinued by a reduction of its fund from \$30,070 to \$1,500. The \$1,500 will be used to maintain a "skeleton" organization for preservation of records and other functions for a period of six months, during which some persons hope arrangements can be made for a county nurse.

The welfare item was originally set by the state at \$66,417, but this figure was reduced by the state since publication of the budget to \$65,035.

District Attorney Charles Swan said some money must be appropriated for the indigent veterans fund, so the board allowed \$100, as compared to \$500 in the first budget. The county was also required to increase the school institute and standard achievement tests fund from \$150 to \$250.

The expense of elections was budgeted at \$2,500, but that figure had to be increased to \$4,000 because of special elections. The courthouse current expense item was reduced from \$8,000 to \$7,000.

The county library fund was reduced from \$18,565 to \$7,800. Complete elimination of the fund was planned, but county officials were reminded that the library board held a contract with the county, requiring the county to appropriate at least three-tenths of a mill for the library, which at the present time amounts to \$7,800.

The miscellaneous fund was cut from \$5,000 to \$2,500. The official advertising item was increased from \$2,000 to \$3,000 because of tax foreclosure proceedings now underway in the county.

For the county veterinarian, the county had budgeted \$4,000. The county is required to budget for the veterinarian, but the board reduced the figure to \$2,000. The county can charge back to the owner half of the cost of testing cattle for tuberculosis and Bang's disease, so the fund was reduced. County Judge Irwin Troxell said the county has not been charging the farmers their half of the cost because of the expense of collections.

Swimming Pool Will Be Erected On Owyhee River

Lankford brothers of Nyssa will start construction this week on a swimming pool to be established by Roy Sewright and Mrs. Mollie Terry of Nyssa near the banks of the Owyhee river 15 miles southwest of Nyssa.

The swimming pool will be located on a 10-acre tract of land that will be developed into a picnic grounds. The owners will seed a lawn and plant large trees this fall.

The covered pool, 35 by 75 feet, will be nine feet deep at one end. It will be filled with naturally warm water, which will have to be cooled because of the high temperature, which at times reaches 142 degrees. The pool will be designed for year-around swimming. The pool will probably be opened in six weeks or two months.

Potato Shipping Is Still Slow

With the potato harvesting starting rather slowly, 85 cars of potatoes had been shipped from Nyssa up to Tuesday night, according to Thomas G. Jones, Union Pacific railroad agent.

During the same period last year, 280 cars of potatoes had been shipped. During the peak of the season last year, as many as 50 cars were shipped in one day.

The slow start of the harvest is due to the new maturity ruling, designed to prevent shipment of immature potatoes, which sometimes reach the market in poor condition.

Only four companies are shipping this week, but the other two are expected to start next week. The present shippers are Muir, Roberts and Burningham, J. C. Watson company, Simplot Western Produce and L. J. Josephson and Son.

Heavy shipments are expected to be started during the first 10 days of August.

Chamber Sponsors Kids Day Program

The Nyssa chamber of commerce voted at its weekly luncheon Wednesday noon to sponsor a "Kids Day" program again this year just prior to the opening of school.

The exact date and other arrangements will be decided upon by a committee to be appointed by President James W. Leslie when he returns from a vacation.

The chamber voted to offer the services of its members in cleaning the Malheur Memorial hospital building prior to the opening of the hospital this fall.

Junior College Idea Is Dropped

School Superintendent Henry Hartley said this week that tentative plans for establishment of a junior college in Nyssa have been dropped.

Investigation has shown some opposition to the plan among residents of the district and some lack of interest on the part of those most likely to attend.

Telephone Firm Starting Work

Construction work on the Nyssa-Adrian rural telephone line has been started, according to C. M. Robertson of Ontario, manager of the Malheur Home Telephone company. The project will take approximately eight months for completion, but service will be provided for new customers as the lines are extended.

H. P. Stommel of Boise, president of the Malheur Home Telephone company said last spring that the project will extend the telephone service to an additional estimated 407 families. The project, costing approximately \$70,000, provides for a total of 535 telephones in the Nyssa-Adrian area.

The materials will include 1100 poles and 230 miles of open wire in addition to the main cable feeder plant, which will extend from Nyssa to Adrian, a distance of 12 and 1/4 miles.

The cable, consisting of 202 wires, will run from the Nyssa office into the rural area for a distance of seven miles. From this point it will taper off to a cable of 102 wires extending for a distance of 2 and 3/4 miles. The last three miles of cable into Adrian will have a 53 wire capacity.

According to Stommel, the company plans to install cables so that relief can be provided on existing lines and installations made for service to customers living immediately adjacent to the main cable lead.

The two additional switchboards, necessitated by this project, will be installed later this year. Much of the other office equipment has already been installed.

Mrs. Katie Fisk Dies Suddenly

Interment was in the Medford cemetery.

Mrs. Butler will go to Salt Lake City to be with her son, Gordon, for a time.

Children Playing In School Water

Dollarhide And Rawlins Win Big Money At Rodeo

2 Cowboys Hurt; Crowds Three Nights Near Capacity

Ross Dollarhide of Lakeview, Oregon and Phil Rawlins of Reseda, California were the top money winners of the Nyssa Night rodeo, which was presented before near-capacity crowds July 20, 21 and 22 under the auspices of the Owyhee Riding club and the Nyssa chamber of commerce.

Despite the power, size and viciousness of the Harley Tucker stock and the speed with which the show was presented, only two serious accidents marred the three performances. Dwight Maddox of Weiser suffered a fracture of the leg the first night, when he plunged over a steer's head after missing the critter's horns. The cross-bred steer, fast and tricky, caused Maddox to miss twice in the bulldogging event. On the second attempt, Maddox crashed onto the ground as the steer continued running.

Harold Scott of Lewiston, Idaho sustained a fracture of the neck when he was thrown from a horse in a bareback ride close to the chutes Saturday night. He arose to his feet and walked to the chutes before he realized his neck was broken.

Cecil Bedford of Touchet, Washington was thrown onto his head and shoulders when a saddle cinch loosened, but he was not injured. According to figures compiled by Grant Rinehart, arena secretary, Ross Dollarhide won the saddle bronc riding, with Cliff Gunderson of Burns second, Bob McGuire of Payette third and George Menkenmaier of Burns fourth. In the first go-around, Menkenmaier won first, Dollarhide second and Cecil Bedford and Bob McGuire tied for third. In the second go-around Dollarhide placed first, Gunderson second and George Lowe and McGuire tied for third. Dollarhide held the best average for the two go-arounds.

In the first bareback go-around, Jim White of Carlsbad, New Mexico placed first, Dick Luke of Sacramento second and Walt Sullins of San Diego and Toby Luvgel of Cheyenne tied for fourth; second go-around, Sullins first, Jack Carson of Burns second, Jim White third, and Dick Luke and Shorty Horn of Douglas, Arizona tied for fourth; average—Sullins first, White second, Luke third and Vaden Ashby of Richland, Oregon fourth.

The calf-roping results were as follows: Best average for two calves, Phil Rawlins in 32.5 seconds; Ed Coffey of Costa Mesa, California, second; Ross Dollarhide, third, and Jack Percifield of Wickenburg, Arizona and Jim Faught of Touchet, Washington, tied for fourth; first go-around, Phil Rawlins, first; Ed Coffey, second; Junior Meeks of Brownfield, Texas, third, and Pat Smith of Dorris, California, fourth; second go-around, Rawlins, first; Dollarhide, second; Percifield, third, and Faught, fourth.

Pat Smith made the best average on two steers in the bulldogging with a combined time of 23.6 seconds. Rawlins was second, Neil Hart of The Dalles, third, and Dollarhide, fourth.
