Aug. 1 Reservoir Storage Highest In Last 4 Years

505,790 Acre Feet Hold-over To Give Good Start For 1951

Present storage in the Owyhee reservoir, 505,790 acre feet, will provide a good hold-over, which should assure ample irrigation water for next year, according to Irrigation Manager, Paul House of the bureau of reclamation.

The present storage also indicates that the hold-over will be the largest since 1947.

With the peak irrigation demand already passed, the daily release from the reservoir will be decreased from now until the end of the season. No date has been set for ending the irrigation season, which usually closes between the end of September and the middle of October.

The daily storage release as of August 1 was 2890 acre feet and the daily inflow from the Owyhee river was 480 acre feet.

August 1 storage each year back to 1946 has been as follows: 1949, 465,940 acre feet; 1948, 35,000 acre feet; 1947, 404,510 acre feet and 1946, 551,260 acre feet.

Man Is Fined On Assault Charge

Max Howard was fined \$50 and assessed \$4.50 costs in Judge Don M. Graham's justice court Tuesday afternoon on a charge of assault and battery in connection with a quarrel with Robert Fischer, Jr. The defendant paid the fine and costs.

Arrested by sheriff's officers July 29, Howard pleaded not guilty during a preliminary hearing and posted \$250 cash bond to appear in court August 2. At that time he asked to change his plea to guilty and was permitted by the court to do so upon motion of District Attorney Charles W. Swan.

Officers said Howard and Fischer were fighting over government ditch water in Owyhee valley seven miles southwest of Nyssa.

The Nyssa residents won places as follows: Fourth in needle and cigarette race; second in the egg and spoon race; first in the children's pole bending relay; fourth in the women's three-eighths mile saddle horse race; fourth in the figure eight race for women; third in the 220-yard dash; first in second heat of pony express race and third in the musical chair race for children.

Co. Health Unit Officially Ends

Dr. G. D. C. Thompson of the state board of health was in Malheur county last week-end to help terminate services of the health department to Malheur county families.

Dr. Thompson met with interested persons representing different organizations at the home of Mrs. Dennis Patch Friday to explain why the X-ray survey unit would not be brought to the county this year and why other services had to be discontinued.

Dr. Thompson also conferred with Dr. L. A. Maulding of Nyssa, now part-time health officer, on how to proceed with his service following the closing of the full-time health department.

Mrs. Alice Simmons will remain in the office of the health department in Vale at least until the end of the year to handle the records and attend to other activities. In the budget published this week in the Gate City Journal, the budget board allowed \$1500 for the department.

Dr. Maulding said "All of the staff of the health department has been disbanded except the office clerk, who will continue on a temporary basis to complete the handling of certain office procedures and carry out a few services in accordance with my requests. This temporary service will cease December 31, 1950 unless public or private funds are forthcoming at that time."

Mrs. Edna Ferris, who has been county health nurse for many years, will leave this week-end for Kansas to visit friends for a few weeks before returning to Oregon to take a position in another county health department.

Harry Henderson House Destroyed

The four-room residence of Mr. and Mrs. Harry O. Henderson and all of the contents of the house were destroyed by fire last Friday afternoon north of Nyssa.

With the family away from home at the time of the fire, Nyssa firemen were called too late to extinguish the blaze. The loss, not covered by insurance, was placed at \$3000.

The house was located on the Burns place, one and one-half miles north of town on the extension of First street. Mr. Henderson is machinist and foreman for the Idaho Canning company.

Recreation And Other Programs At Camp Viewed

Speaker Says Kindness To Cause People To Live Cleaner Lives

The increase in the magnitude of the program conducted at the Nyssa labor camp was emphasized by Robert Fulton in a discussion given at the weekly luncheon of the Nyssa chamber of commerce Wednesday, noon in Carl's Doll House.

Along with a program of recreation and entertainment, the organization has greatly increased job placements during the last three years. In 1948 the employment service in the county placed more than 7000 persons in jobs, in 1949 slightly over 9000 and this year the total is expected to reach 12,000 by the end of the year.

All of the 152 cabins and tents at the camp are occupied and from 40 to 50 persons are sleeping in trucks and other places, so the population of the camp runs between 750 and 800.

Mr. Fulton, who is promoting the recreation and entertainment program at the camp, briefly referred to the publicity attendant on the labor trouble in Nyssa a short time ago.

"I knew there were a lot of good people at the camp and I wanted to do something about it," Fulton said. "I started one colored softball team and started collecting donations to pay for the equipment. I have received contributions ranging from \$2 to \$15 from Nyssa merchants to help in the program. I am trying to make two sets of equipment for six teams. I have ordered volleyball equipment. The lumber yards donated the lumber, the telephone company gave some posts and the city leveled the ground. I have received the finest possible co-operation from local residents. We are going to have an ice cream social a week from tonight, August 9. The city band has been asked to play."

"We have a lot of musical talent. We have a colored quartet. One colored man, a good pianist, has developed a chorus. We practice every night for our radio program. Last week Jack Burger of KSRV gave us an audition. We have folks from little fellows to professional radio folks. Beginning this Friday, our program will be on the air from 9 to 9:30 p. m."

The speaker concluded that "bringing in family groups will be a bigger help to the farmers and cause less trouble in town. A little kindness will help those people to live cleaner lives and provide an incentive for them to be assets to the community."

Rev. C. L. Callahan Called To Spokane

Rev. C. L. Callahan, pastor of the Episcopal churches at Nyssa, Ontario and Vale, has been appointed as canon of St. John the Evangelist cathedral in Spokane.

Few Changes Made In Hunting Laws

The Oregon state game commission met Saturday, July 29, after a public hearing, and adopted the final hunting regulations for 1950. Very few changes were made, so the final hunting regulations are nearly the same as the tentative regulations released several weeks ago.

In a major change the commission moved the October 1 deer season opening to September 30. This will allow a Saturday opening and three full week-ends of hunting during the general deer season.

Several areas listed for the two-day hunter's choice deer season were changed. The high desert section east of Bend was eliminated from this season. In addition, all of Hood River county outside the exterior boundaries of the Mt. Hood National forest was open for the hunter's choice season.

Two changes in bag limits were also made. The first raised the bag on valley quail to 10 a day and 30 a season. The other set the bag limit on banded-tailed pigeons, if allowed by federal regulations, at eight a day and 24 a season.

The moving of the trapping season opening in Malheur county from November 15 to November 1 completed the changes.

The 1950 hunting regulations in printed form will be available at all game commission license agencies by the first week of September.

Rules Given On Fair At Ontario

With only four weeks remaining until the gates of the Malheur county fair are opened, the directors reminded prospective livestock exhibitors this week that it is now time to advise the board of their intention to exhibit their animals in the open class division.

Due to the increasing number of animals shown each year at the fair, officials deem it necessary to require pre-registration this year to insure space for all livestock, according to Neil Hoffman, chairman of the fair board.

Application for entry must bear date of birth or age of animal, name of animal in case of cattle, the breed, ear tags and tattoo number, and in the case of pedigreed animals, registry number is also required. Pre-registration forms may be found in the premium book, copies of which have been distributed to all rural bookshelves in the county, or may be secured upon request at the county agent's office. This form must be on file in the office of the fair board, city hall, Ontario, by August 26.

Health requirements this year remain the same as last year. All cattle must be accompanied by a Bang's and T. B. health certificate issued within 60 days of date of exhibition by a federally-accredited veterinarian. Calves less than six months do not need these papers.

Several other new regulations are in effect this year. Exhibitors will be limited to not more than two animals in any lot number and to one prize money in any one lot. There will be no formal entry fee this year as has been the custom in the past. Straw for bedding will be furnished, but a nominal charge will be made for hay. To aid the exhibitor who must bring his animals for some distance and who has to leave them at home, fair officials plan to provide a helper who may be hired for a minimum fee to perform chores. Tuesday, with District Attorney Charles Swan representing the plaintiff and Clyde Snider of Nyssa representing Trent. Some of the witnesses for the defense did not appear, so the court, after conferring with the attorneys, set a new date for the hearing. Trent's bond of \$250 was continued.

Freezing Cable Halts Telephone Work At Nyssa

Project To Be Resumed As Soon As Government Releases Wire

The Malheur Home Telephone company, which has been preparing for several months for construction of a telephone line from Nyssa to Adrian, announced through its Ontario manager, C. M. Robertson, last week-end that the project has been temporarily halted by a government order "freezing" telephone cable, which is essential for the Nyssa-Adrian construction.

Work on the project had actually been started, and Robertson notified H. P. Stommel, president of the company at Boise, that he was ready for the cable. In attempting to determine why the cable had not arrived, Stommel was notified of the government order.

Robertson emphasized that the project had not been discontinued. "As soon as the government releases the cable we will start work again," the manager said.

Reports indicate that the government may be able to release some cable during the last quarter of the year.

Robertson said telephone work in the county that does not require cable will be continued. Conversion of the Vale exchange back to a dial system will probably be completed in about 60 days. This work will permit the Oregon-Washington Telephone company to install equipment in a new exchange at Harper, which will serve the Harper and Little valley areas and provide an outlet to Vale. Extension of service in the Lincoln heights section will also be continued.

Nyssa Team Drops Into Third Place In Border League

The Nyssa baseball team lost to Burns by a score of 4 to 1 on the Burns diamond last Sunday to drop into a tie with Vale for third place in the Border league.

Emmett is leading the league with 10 wins and four losses, Burns is second with nine wins and four losses and Nyssa and Vale are tied for third with eight wins and four losses.

Nyssa made four hits and Burns five hits. Nyssa committed only one error, but the Burns batters took advantage of eight walks given by Cleaver and score their four runs.

The Nyssa team will play Vale here Friday night under the lights in the last home game of the season.
