## Caldwell Getting Ready For Rodeo

CALDWELL—In the best traditions of the old west, the Caldwell Night rodeo August 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 will offer an all-western program of thrills and spills with the nation's top cow punchers in the leading role. J. C. "Doc" Sorenson of Camas, Idaho, will provide some of the roughest stock in the business for the show. Atmosphere of the old west is evident as townspeople don colorful rodeo regalia in keeping with the spirit of the 16th annual affair.

The rodeo grounds were reported in excellent condition by Telpher E. Wright, secretary of the rodeo board. The board has ruled that no reserve seats will be sold, since "every seat in the house affords an excellent view for its occupant."

Program for the five-night show will include bulldozing, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, brama bull riding, wild horse race and cow cutting contest. Wild horses from the Owyhee breaks provide one of the most dangerous but most exciting events of the card. The cow cutting contest is a new addition to the Caldwell show designed to demonstrate the ability of trained horses in removing animals from a herd.

Among the specialty acts to be interspersed between the major events are the first northwest showing of the trained Brahma bull act, Ken Boen and his trained mule, and Ray Ramsey and his Flying Clouds. The trained bull act features Fess Reynolds and six brahma bulls in a liberty act.

Clowns and bullfighters will be active throughout the show to protect the cowpokes from injury at the hands of the rough stock. Ike Aacter and his mule, Solo, with his clowning antics will provide a helping hand for Ken Boen.

The 23 riding clubs of the area have been invited to participate in the parade and grand entry to precede each night's performance of the rodeo.

The cowpunchers will compete for day money, and purses of \$7000, as well as special awards such as saddles and belts.

## 35 Jerseys To Be Sold At Ontario

Thirty-five fine young pedigreed Jerseys from 35 of the best known herds of western and central Oregon are available for pre-sale inspection at the Ontario fairgrounds on or after Thursday, August 10, where they will be sold at auction Saturday, August 12. The sale will be started at 12:30 with Earl Walters of Piler, Idaho as auctioneer. Lunch may be procured at the fairgrounds.

These young animals are backed by the best blood strains in the United States and Canada, according to L. A. Hulbert, Independence, Oregon, sale manager. They have been carefully selected from herds of leading Jersey breeders of the state, where high-production records have been established.

The sale will be sponsored by the Oregon Jersey Cattle club and will be the only sale that group will hold this year, states Marlin M. Fox, president. It has been placed in Ontario at the request of breeders of that locality who are desirous of securing good young Jerseys from

some of the western Oregon herds that have gained national recognition.

Essentially the event will be a heifer sale, although three young bulls are listed, one each from the herds of Frank Schutzwahl of Grants Pass and George Gentemann and M. N. Tibbles of Independence. A few of the heifers are bred, but the majority will be sold open.

The cattle will arrive at the Ontario fairgrounds August 8 for a brief rest. Catalogs listing the entries may be procured at the fairgrounds or from Lee Stoker, Route 3, Parma, Idaho, eastern Oregon member of the state fieldman committee.
