**County Acreage Of Onions Climbs**

Malheur County's onion acreage increased from 2700 acres grown in 1949 to an estimated 9200 acres this year, according to the July 1 acreage report prepared by the bureau of agricultural economics.

The report also shows that the total acreage in the nation growing late summer onions increased from approximately 63,000 acres in 1949 to an estimated 66,250 acres intended for harvest this year. The 10-year average of all states growing late onions is slightly over 62,000 acres, according to the report.
