Rev. Vestal, whose home is in Dallas, Texas, developed his message in successive stages as his life's story unfolds from night to night and he states that his messages get better and more powerful. His meetings have been sponsored throughout the western part of the United States by many church groups.

The minister's topics during the next few days will be as follows: Thursday, 8 p. m., "My Conversion in Prison"; "Will God Save a Criminal" and Delinquency from Dope

by the Power of Christ"; Friday, "The Pleading of My Dying Lawyer and the Devil's Sweat Box"; "My Experience With the Angels In My Death House"; "Five Steps From the Scaffold" and "What Happened to the Gallows"; Sunday, 11 a. m., "The Bank Robber and His Little Book", and Sunday evening, "The Death March"; "Behold the Hour Has Come"; "Goodby Mother and Good Morning to Jesus".

The services are sponsored by Rev. and Mrs. Lloyd N. Founds of Nyssa, who wish to express their appreciation for the help of all the people who have made this meeting possible with their presence and contribution. RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Peach Ice Cream Cake

1 cup canned sliced peaches, drained
1/3 cup sugar
1/2 cup Segó Milk
2 thin slices plain cake, 4 in. square
2 tablespoons sugar
1 tablespoon lemon juice
3/4 teaspoon grated lemon rind
Put peaches and 1/2 cup sugar into saucepan; mash. Boil vigorously 5 min., stirring often. Chill. Chill milk until ice cold. Line bottom of refrigerator tray with cake slices. Spread chilled peach mixture on cake. Add 2 tablesp. sugar to chilled milk. Whip with cold rotary beater until fluffy; add lemon juice and rind. Whip until stiff. Put on top of peach mixture. Freeze, without stirring, in automatic refrigerator at coldest temperature until firm. Makes 4 servings.
*3/4 cup drained, crushed pineapple also can be used if sugar is reduced to 1/4 cup.
