Government Will Give Camp Help

public housing administration for additional shelters.
Jered Lewis of Nyssa, district manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company explained that during the war the camp was operated by the department of agriculture. After the war it was leased to the Malheur County Farm Labor Sponsors association, whose funds were so limited

the camp became an ugly spot. The department of agriculture offered to sell it to the labor sponsors, but in turn they were faced with the problem of rehabilitation of the facilities. The labor sponsors were advised that the housing administration would place the camp in good physical condition.

Mr. Batnick said the camp has not been "paying its own way, but we hope to work out a sound program so that it can do so".

Arthur P. Gough, operations engineer of the public housing administration office at Seattle, emphasized that "the integral parts of your economy are water, land, the co-operation between the people and the necessity for seasonal farm labor. There are a lot of very worth-

while people in the camp".
H. L. Arment, manager of the United States employment service office in Ontario, said "We are vitally interested in anything that will stabilize labor. Our job is dispatching labor, which is fundamentally important to our community. With 800 persons living in the Nyssa camp, one-third of the persons on your streets come from the camp".

Louis Vandrell, placement officer at the Nyssa camp, said that "For the amount of labor we have we need more housing".

In introducing the visitors at the luncheon, Mr. Lewis said "I want to compliment Mr. Arment and Mr. Vandrell on the fine job they have done this summer."

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Duchess Potato Salad

2 slices bacon, finely cut
1/4 cup finely cut onion
2 teaspoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1/3 cup vinegar
1 cup Segoe Milk
3 cups sliced, cooked potatoes
1 1/3 cups cut-up drained green beans, cooked or canned
1 cup cut-up celery

Cook bacon slowly until crisp. Remove bacon pieces and save. Add onion to fat; cook slowly 5 min. Blend in flour. Add salt, sugar, mustard, pepper and vinegar. Cook and stir until thickened. Remove from heat; stir into milk. Put bacon pieces and vegetables into bowl; add dressing. Mix gently until vegetables are coated with dressing. Makes 4 servings.

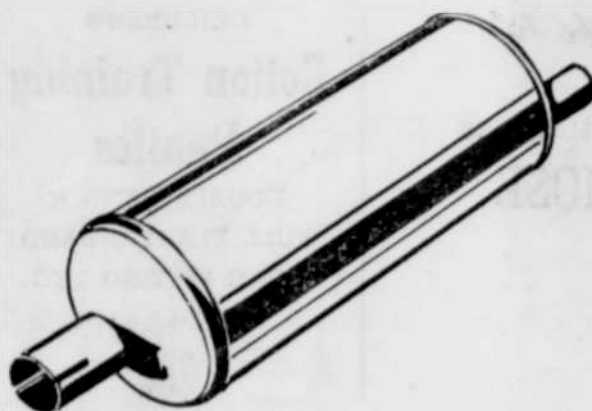

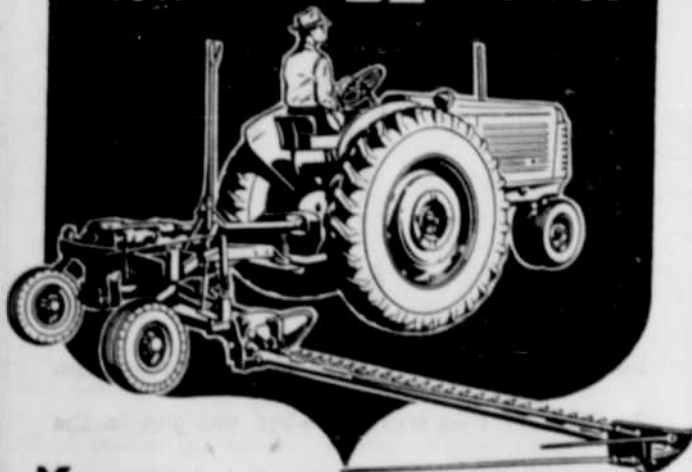
