Plans Announced For Opening Of School Classes

Date Set For September 5; New Building To Be In Use

Administrators announced plans Wednesday for the opening of the Nyssa schools Tuesday, September 5.

Dennis W. Patch, high school principal, announced that he will send to students this week information about schedules, registrations, courses and other plans. Registration of students will be held from 9 a. m. to 12 and from 1 to 4 p. m. August 29, 30 and 31 and September 1. The seniors will register Tuesday, the juniors Wednesday, sophomores Thursday and freshmen Friday. Late registrations will be accepted Saturday from 9 to 12 a. m. Students working during the day may register Thursday and Friday nights from 7 to 9 o'clock.

Students of the junior high school, including the seventh and eighth grades, will first report Tuesday, September 5 at 8:50 a. m. in the new school building. Junior high students are asked to enter the building through the two southeast entrances, where notices will be posted on bulletin boards showing the rooms to which students are to report. School will be in session only in the morning, from 8:40 to 11:55, Tuesday. During that time all classes will be held and lockers, lessons and books will be assigned. Principal Muri Lancaster said.

Students who were not registered in the Nyssa junior high school last year will register Tuesday morning. Notices telling where to register will be posted on the bulletin boards in the front entrances. Students will not need to take lunches Tuesday as bus drivers will take them home at noon.

Persons wanting children in the first, second and third grades to attend Arcadia school should contact Principal Walker McPartland next week. Others in the lower six grades will report at the elementary building in Nyssa. Children must be six or before November 14 in order to be enrolled in the first grade.

The janitors have been busy receiving and placing furniture in the expanded school facility in the hope of being in readiness for the school opening. They have been renovating and re-decorating the older buildings during the summer.

Superintendent Henry Hartley announced that all faculties for the school year have been completed.

A few Nyssa implement dealers, Finley and Bagby company, Western Corrugator company and the Owyhee Truck and Implement company, and the Armo-Tile and Drainage company will have exhibits at the fair. The Hartley Produce company, the Amalgamated Sugar company and Muir, Roberts and Burningham will award trophies for outstanding produce displays.

Teacher Called; Successor Named

Guy Poorman, scheduled to be a mathematics instructor in the Nyssa high school, has been called to active duty with the navy, in which he is an ensign.

Poorman was graduated last spring from Peabody college in Tennessee and took special work at the University of Washington this summer preparatory to taking the Nyssa teaching position.

Superintendent Henry Hartley announced Wednesday that Frank A. Mazzio of Greeley, Colorado, has been employed in place of Mr. Poorman. Mr. Mazzio, who received his master's degree from Colorado State College of Education, will teach English in the Nyssa high school.

Autopsy Shows Natural Death

An autopsy performed by Dr. J. Beeman, Boise pathologist, revealed that Alfredo Baldemar Giron of Nyssa died last Saturday of natural causes. Death resulted from lung trouble.

Giron was found ill in the rear of the Nyssa tavern and B. B. Lienkaemper started with him to the Ontario hospital in an ambulance, but he died en route to the hospital.

At first, Giron was believed to have been the victim of an accident or foul play, but the autopsy and X-rays did not reveal any injuries, officers said.

The youthful Mexican was born December 29, 1930 at Ortiz, Colorado and came here from Monte Vista, Colorado. He was a farm laborer. Funeral services have not been arranged. The body is in the Nyssa funeral home.

Davis Softball Team Wins Title

The Davis Gas and Oil company softball team of Ontario won the sub-district tournament with the right to enter the district play-offs against Baker or La Grande by defeating Tobler's Feed and Fuel of Nyssa twice in a three-game series this week.

Tobler's won the first game of the series Sunday night by a score of 10 to 5 and should have clinched the title in the second game, but "muffed" the contest 5 to 4 on the Ontario field Monday night.

In a close exciting game played Tuesday night, Davis won by a score of 5 to 4.

The second game of the play-offs was disheartening to Nyssa fans because of errors and bad breaks that resulted in the Ontario victory. With Nyssa leading 2 to 1 at the beginning of the fourth inning, Ontario scored two runs on two hits and two errors to take a 3 to 2 lead and went further ahead in the fifth frame on a home run scored by Anderson.

Nyssa tied the count in the seventh frame, usually the last in a softball game, on a single by Barker, a triple by Anderson and a double by C. Wilson. Wilson and Anderson scored. Hartley Speaks To County PTA On School Bill

George Carlson of Vale Also Talks At All-day Meeting

Speaking on the so-called children's bill, which will appear on the November ballot, Henry H. Hartley of Nyssa told the county council of the Malheur County Parent-Teacher association at a meeting held in the Nyssa high school building last Friday that Oregon provides less state aid for schools than any other state in the northwest.

The Nyssa school superintendent talked on the legislative program of the P. T. A. from the national standpoint, but emphasized his discussion on the children's bill.

The bill would increase the contribution of the state from \$50 to \$80 per census child. At the present time Oregon's contribution is less than 30 per cent of the school cost. California pays 52 per cent, Washington 75 per cent, New Mexico 34 per cent, Utah 37 per cent and Nevada 40 per cent.

"The bill will go on the ballot as a property tax proposal," Mr. Hartley said. "It is to be that way because the state has to vote to exceed the six per cent limitation the same as any of its governmental agencies. The only thing income tax can be used for in Oregon is to offset property tax. It is inherent in income tax legislation in Oregon, so in order to exceed the six per cent limitation, which it amounts to, the tax has to be voted as a property tax. It might some time have to be paid as a property tax, but even then it would be spread over a wider area."

"The theory is that the wider the tax base the more equitable the program is."

"If we maintain our schools in the state on the present basis, we will have to have more money. It is up to the people whether they want to raise it on a local or state basis. This proposal would each year use part of the now-dormant state income tax fund."

Sponsors of the bill are the Oregon State Grange, the Oregon Young Republican club, the Oregon Young Democratic club, the republican and democratic state central committees, the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, the Oregon Education association, the Junior chambers of commerce, the CIO and the Oregon Farmers Union.

Following the opening of the meeting by the president, Mrs. W. W. Foster of Nyssa, the minutes of the last meeting were read by Mrs. Bernard Eastman, secretary and a report was given by the treasurer, Arthur Smith of Vale.

Harry Sandquist, fair board secretary, said early activity indicates a larger fair than last year, when awnings had to be stretched between the barns to take care of the overflow of livestock.

Interest is waxing warmer in all divisions as the opening date of the fair approaches. Teutsch Former Nyssa Resident

William L. Teutsch, assistant director of the Oregon State college extension service, who died unexpectedly August 10 while on a vacation in central Oregon, lived at Nyssa for several years.

Mr. Teutsch came to Nyssa with his father, his sister and two brothers, who located on a tract of land which is now the site of the E. C. Crandall acreage southwest of Nyssa.

Mr. Teutsch finished grade school here and in 1911 entered Nyssa high school, which he attended for two years before going to Portland, where he lived with his sister and completed his high school course. While in Nyssa, Mr. Teutsch played basketball in the present Episcopal parish hall and also played football.

Following the death of his father, a carpenter, Mr. Teutsch made his home with Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Sherwood for two years. The Teutsch addition to the city of Nyssa is named in honor of the family.

Born in Tacoma, Washington June 6, 1897, Mr. Teutsch spent more than 30 years in the field of agriculture and was one of the very few former Malheur county residents to gain statewide recognition in that field.

He was graduated from Oregon State college in 1920 and with the exception of one year spent as editor and publisher of the Lake County Examiner at Lakeview, he devoted the remainder of his life to the O. S. C. extension service.

After serving as county agent in two or three counties, Mr. Teutsch became assistant state county agent leader and in 1940 became assistant director of the extension service. He was granted a sabbatical leave in 1948 to accept a Carnegie foundation grant for study at Harvard university and upon completion of his studies received a degree of master of public administration.

Mr. Teutsch, who was active in church and civic affairs, was married to Frieda Spitzbart of West Salem in 1921. Besides his widow, he leaves two sons, Dr. William L. Jr. of Mill City and Thomas Teutsch of McMinnville, and a daughter, Mrs. Jack Hughes of Seattle.

Chamber Plans Entertainment For Youngsters

Pet Parade, Show And Games Set For Afternoon Of Sept. 1

Another day of entertainment has been arranged by the Nyssa chamber of commerce as a treat to the children who will enter school in September and also the younger boys and girls who are still too young for formal study of reading, writing and arithmetic.

Any child old enough to walk from First and Main streets to the park and anyone young enough to be able to avoid embarrassment is invited to participate in the "kids" pet parade, which will be started at 1:30 p. m.
