Gordon's Drive-In RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Ranch Style Corn

1/3 cup finely cut bacon
3 tablespoons finely cut onion
1 1/2 cups canned, cream style corn
1/4 teaspoon salt
few grains pepper
2 unbeaten eggs
1/4 cup Sego Milk

Cook bacon slowly until crisp. Drain off fat; save bacon. Put 2 tablesp. fat back into skillet. Add onion and cook slowly 5 min. Add corn, salt and pepper. Heat to boiling.
