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Prizes Will Be Given For Baby Born In Hospital

Several Hundred Dollars Worth Of Gifts To Be Displayed

Because of spontaneous offers of local merchants to donate prizes for the first baby born in the new Malheur Memorial hospital, the founders service organization is making arrangements for collection of such prizes, according to President Fred Bracken.

A considerable number of prizes has already been offered, but many more can be used. Anyone desiring to contribute, should notify Fred Bracken or Wilton Jackson by September 15.

The prizes, to be awarded under the sponsorship of the FSO, will be displayed in the hospital with donors' names affixed and will be publicized in the local newspaper.

Judging from interest shown, as many as 60 or 85 prizes will probably be offered by business firms, Bracken said. The type and value of the prizes will be left to the discretion of the donors.

It is very necessary that persons wanting to donate should decide on their gifts before September 15 so the prizes can be properly displayed in the hospital at the time of the grand opening.

Among other offers, the local doctors propose to deliver free of charge the first baby born in the hospital.

Hospital Ground Will Be Cleaned

Robert F. Thompson, chairman of the committee that will have charge of cleaning the Malheur Memorial hospital grounds, announced Wednesday that lawn will be planted in the immediate vicinity of the building within the next 10 days.

Representatives of the Intermountain Heating and Plumbing company of Boise will start laying the water line to the hospital from Alberta avenue today.

John Palmer of the Western Corrugator company has offered to donate the use of equipment for leveling the ground preparatory to planting seed. Many of the weeds now covering the ground will be eliminated with the leveling equipment.

As soon as the pipe laying and leveling work has been done, volunteers from the founders service organization and other groups will be asked to remove the remainder of the weeds and pickup rocks. Mr. Thompson will notify the volunteers relative to the day selected for work.

City Manager E. K. Burton will establish the grade for the lawn.

Les Ditty House Lost In Flames

The Leslie Ditty house in Sunset valley, occupied by Nelson Field, was completely destroyed by fire Sunday morning.

About four in the morning, Nelson Field awoke to find his bedroom wall ablaze and was only able to escape through a window.

The men were sent to Boise on the first step of service in the armed forces.

"We have had no definite notice yet but there is every indication that our next induction will be after the middle of September when other men will start off to fulfill their responsibilities and privileges of citizenship", Graves said.

Opening Is Set For Substation

A public opening and dedication of Idaho Power company's new terminal substation one mile north-west of Ontario, which will serve the entire lower Snake river valley, has been set for Tuesday evening, September 5. A reception at 7 o'clock will precede the program to commence at 7:30.

T. E. Roach, president and general manager of the Idaho Power company, will perform the dedication, following a welcome talk by J. Dyer Bennett, mayor of Ontario. Earl A. Bopp, president of the Ontario chamber of commerce, will be master of ceremonies.

Responses will be given by J. A. McMillan, mayor of Payette, representing the cities of the lower Snake river valley; Fred M. Moss, president of the Idaho Canning company of Nyssa and Payette, representing industry, and Alva P. Goodell, Malheur county commissioner, representing the agricultural interests of the area. Light refreshments will be served following the program.

"The public is invited to attend for inspection of the million-dollar installation," L. W. Brainard, the company's division manager at Payette, said in announcing the event. Idaho Power employees will be on hand to explain the functions of the station. Mobile line equipment, including heavy duty transports and other vehicles used in modern utility operations will be on display.

The new substation has more than four times the capacity of the old installation at Ontario and is adequate for future as well as present terminal substation requirements of the entire lower Snake River valley. Its two big transformers, each of 30,000-kva. capacity, take power from the inter-connected generating plants on the Snake river. It is connected to Caldwell and to Boise by way of Emmett by 138,000-volt transmission lines and has four 69,000-volt transmission-feeder lines. One extends to Weiser, another to Huntington and the others to Emmett and to Caldwell.

Leseberg Given Street Contract On City Project

Local Contractor bids \$1,411.15 Under City Estimate For Work

Following submission of bids at a special meeting of the city council Tuesday night, the council awarded a contract to C. E. Leseberg of Nyssa for the city's share of improvement of King avenue and Park avenue.

Leseberg's bid was \$16,748.45 as compared to a city estimate of \$18,159.60. Heldt brothers of Nyssa submitted a bid of \$18,588.82.

The contract covers curbing, catch basins, man-holes and drains, excavation and rock fill.

The council specified no date for the start or completion of the work, but Leseberg is expected to start the project soon. As its part of the state-aid project, the city is to finish laying the course rock this fall so that it will have a winter's traffic over it before the state applies the surface in the spring.

The state may spend as much as \$15,000 on the two projects. On King avenue the improvement will extend from First street to the highway and on Park avenue from highway 20 to the city limits.

Scholarship For Nurse Proposed

The Nyssa chamber of commerce voted at its weekly luncheon Wednesday noon to sponsor a \$150 scholarship to be used for training of a nurse or technician desiring to enter service in the Malheur Memorial hospital.

The scholarship, offered on a loan basis, will be available to persons needing help to further their education. The scholarship will be given to a young man or woman high school graduate after he or she has served an apprenticeship at the hospital.

Besides his widow and parents, Werdermann is survived by the small sons, two sisters and a brother.

Fine Sheep Co. Given Damages

Judge James Alger Fee, holding a special session of United States district court in Vale, awarded \$5735 to the Fine Sheep company Wednesday noon for damages sustained by reason of canal breaks occurring on the Owyhee project July 14 and 18, 1946.

Judge Fee had previously ruled that the plaintiff was entitled to damages from the government and held the hearing this week to determine the amount to be awarded. The judge had also previously denied damages to 55 farmers on the project for loss on crops caused by a shortage of water resulting from canal breaks. The farmers have appealed this decision to a higher court through their attorneys, Gallagher and Gallagher of Ontario. Judge Fee held the suits came under a different classification of damages. He ruled that it was necessary to show negligence in the case of alleged damage to crops caused by shortage of water, but not in the case of damage caused by flood waters.

Following the decision in the Fine case, Judge Fee immediately opened a hearing in the case of Ira Ure of Nyssa versus the government. Ure is the other one of the two land owners allowed by Judge Fee to seek remuneration for damages caused by the floods. He is represented in the hearing by Lytle and Kilpatrick of Vale.

The government is represented in the cases by attorneys for several departments of the government.

Fruitland Oil Terminal Opened

A new petroleum products terminal now being completed by Standard Oil company of California at Fruitland, Idaho, received a test shipment of several thousand gallons of gasoline last week through the 560-mile Salt Lake-to-Pasco, Washington, oil products pipeline. The plant is expected to go into full operation September 1.

The terminal at Fruitland, covering 4½ acres, is one of eight located along the line. It has six tanks, with a total storage capacity of approximately 40,000 barrels of petroleum products, and is designed to serve the needs of motorists, home owners, farmers and other consumers in the surrounding territory.

In addition to the tanks for two grades of gasoline, other tanks will contain supplies of stove oil, diesel fuel and furnace oil. The plant has a warehouse, office, garage and shop, as well as a modern truck loading rack, which will accommodate two trucks at once.

The new Fruitland terminal is another unit in the program of Standard to insure an adequate constant supply of petroleum products to the rapidly expanding intermountain area market. Bulk stations to be served from the new plant include those at McCall, Weiser and Midvale, Idaho and Nyssa, Vale, Ontario and Huntington, Oregon.

Governor Warns Of Sacrifices Because Of Korean War

Jeanne Jones of Ontario was selected as queen of the Malheur County fair at a dance sponsored by the Exchange club in the veterans hall in Ontario Wednesday night. Her attendants are Coleen Bybee of Nyssa and Sylvia Welberg of Ontario. Miss Jones was presented with a hand-tooled buckskin jacket and each of the princesses was given a silver belt buckle, in-laid with gold.

Before officially opening the 41st edition of the Malheur county fair and viewing the great quantity of farm crops, livestock, home economics and other types of exhibits at the fairgrounds in Ontario Wednesday afternoon, Governor Douglas McKay told members of Ontario civic organizations at a luncheon held in the Moore hotel that Oregonians and residents of the rest of the United States can expect to make sacrifices because of the Korean war.

At the fairgrounds, Governor McKay delivered a short talk from a hay wagon and was presented with a sack of onions by Neil Hoffman, fair superintendent, on behalf of Malheur county onion growers. While waiting to be introduced, the governor sat on a bale of hay on the low-slung wagon. Hoffman, who is also superintendent of the Malheur experiment station, was introduced by Dyer Bennett, mayor of Ontario.

Repeating that he was proud of Malheur county for its agricultural accomplishments, Governor McKay said the Lake Labish area near Salem can out-produce this section on some crops, but not on onions. "Since the advent of the Owyhee project, your territory has changed to row crop area", the governor said. "You have done a marvelous job. After all the best way to farm is by irrigation, through which you can control the water. I like county fairs and I like agriculture. I wish you success in conducting your fair and in your agricultural efforts."

At the noon luncheon, Governor McKay said "The No. 1 subject in all of the United States is fast victory in Korea. I don't think we are going to be kicked off the land, but anything can happen. That is the first line of defense against communism. The northern Koreans are not super-men, but they have had super-training. The only thing those Russians understand is brute strength."

"This is no time for us to be arguing among ourselves. It is time for action. We can find out later what was the matter with our military preparedness. Regardless of what happens in Korea, we are committed to a big defense project, until we find out who is running this country. "The government wants specialists who served in world war II. Many are going back into service without complaint, because they know there is a job to be done. Our sacrifices can't be considered as compared to theirs. This is a time to keep our feet on the ground. It is too bad we have to live in this uncertainty, but we are not going to be pushed around. I think we would prefer ourselves and our children to be dead rather than slaves to anyone."

"Preparedness is going to cost a lot of money. The Russians may run on for 10 or 15 years. We are going to have tax increases on the federal level. We are going to be faced with the problem of a lot of people being called out of industry. "The second thing I am worried (Continued on Page 8)
