

Owyhee Farm Shop Destroyed By Fire

OWYHEE, Aug. 31—Members of the Owyhee Community club served lunch at the farm sale held Thursday at the Frank Asumendi place. The club made \$14.31 for the treasury.

An early morning fire Tuesday destroyed a cinder block shop used to house laborers on the Roland Maw farm. The roof and lining of the building burned rapidly, shooting flames far into the air. A frame building covered with tar paper just a few feet away did not catch fire, although the tar paper was blistered. The big house on the place is being remodeled by Mr. and Mrs. Maw and is nearly ready for occupancy. No one was on the place when the fire started. The tenants were working in the potato fields. Nyssa fire district firemen received a call about the fire, but were unable to take equipment out of the district. They went to the Maw farm, but the building had been destroyed when they reached the scene.
