Dance Festival Held By Primary

The new second ward L.D.S. chapel was the scene of the Nyssa stake primary festival held Thursday evening, August 24, with 300 children participating.

The program was opened with a Scandinavian picnic scene, in which children representing Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland sang the songs and presented dances of those countries in colorful costumes. The group, some on foot and some on bicycles, gathered together for a picnic meal, as a conversion story was told to them.

The next scene was in the British isles, where a parade was held, with a boy and girl representing the king and queen riding on a float guarded by the king's army. The next float featured a group of May queens, followed by girls with jumping ropes entwined with flowers. The winding of the May pole was a feature of this scene.

A group of Irish fairies playing games and dancing the Irish jig, preceded the entrance of a float carrying a lovely fairy, and a clever elf under a toadstool.

Wales was represented by boys in top hats and longtailed coats. Scotland's float was decorated with blue bells, typical of the country, with three Scotch lassies in plaid skirts on the float followed by a group of Scotch lads and lassies, three of whom did a Scottish dance.

The next scene was laid in the isles of the Pacific with natives of the Hawaiian islands in grass skirts giving a hula. Children representing natives from Samoa, New Zealand and Tahiti arrived in boats and were dressed in typical costumes of the islands. The hula and poi dances were danced by a group of girls in grass skirts. Hawaiian songs were sung by the group, finishing with Aloha Oe, as they departed.

The final group showed an encampment of Indians of various tribes. These presented ceremonial dances, the sun dance, the eagle dance and the friendship dance. The Indian scene was complete with the erecting of teepees and the building of campfires. Drums made by the members of this group were brought into use, and the girls re-

presenting squaws carried their papooses in back cradles.

The 300 children participating were in the finale making a colorful closing to the pageant festival. All missionaries of the stake were honored during the grand finale. The ward bishops, the primary presidents and the stake presidency were presented with leis by the Hawaiian group. The children participating were from the Vale, Owyhee, Ontario, Parma and Nyssa first and second wards. They were assisted by the officers and teachers of those wards. The stake officers and board members in charge of the festival were Iona Plinders, Florence Bybee, Pearl Woodard, Mary Savage, Norma Burnett, Jane Short, Sue Burton, Fern Hooper, Cora Mitchell, Joan Child, Mima Garner, Leona Blodgett, Ethel Stoker and Sarah Stanger.

about is the railroad car shortage. We have to go all out to get supplies to the boys in Korea. We can't do much about the car shortage, but we are going to be hurt by it."

The governor gave as his point the need of economy among public employees, including those working for the federal and state governments and municipalities, especially now because of the certainty of increased taxes.

"We hear a lot about security," the governor said, "but there is no such thing. We must not make security our objective. We should make opportunity our objective. We must preserve opportunity for our people;

but, of course, we are not going to let people starve. The first requisite to good citizenship is to vote. That sounds simple, but it is very difficult to get people to vote. I would stake my life on the judgment of the people of Oregon if they voted 100 per cent, but not on a 50 per cent vote. In the 50 per cent vote, the pressure groups and the politicians are out in force."

The governor was introduced by Earl Bopp, Kiwanis club program chairman, who was in turn presented by Don Lynch, Kiwanis club president who presided at the luncheon.

The three candidates for queen of the Malheur County fair, Colleen Bybee of Nyssa, Sylvia Welberg of Ontario, and Jeanne Jones of Ontario, were introduced by Ernest Jorgensen, president of the Exchange club.

Larry Hightower, who has pushed a wheelbarrow through 48 states, asked Governor McKay to autograph his green Washington state flag as 14 other governors have done. The governor affixed his signature with Mrs. McKay watching him. Robert Butson led the group in singing two songs.
