Superintendent Henry Hartley discussed the proposed sale of the Oregon Trail schoolhouse. He said money from the sale could be used to add to one of the present buildings or be used as the nucleus for an entirely new unit. If the sale is approved by the school patrons at an election the property will be advertised for sale and sold to the highest bidder. The board of directors have set a minimum price of \$15,000 on the property.

(Continued from Page 1) ing sum of \$2500 with no jail sentence and another man was fined the sum of \$500. "What kind of administration is there in Washington that would whitewash such a case. In that instance the department of justice actually acted in defense of the communists. You will never hear of a more revolting case. If we do not criticize this condition, it is time for us to call our kids home from Korea and turn in our suits". "Johnson destroyed our fighting forces when he knew the communists intended to destroy our government. Twenty days before Korea was invaded, the president said, 'We are closer to peace than we have been for five years'.
