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Figures Given On Nyssa Bank

Figures compiled by the Nyssa branch of the First National Bank of Portland show that on September 30, deposits at the branch amounted to \$2,945,652, and loans, \$2,825,543. The totals were made available by G. J. Mitchell, manager, in line with a new policy of First National to publish its financial statements quarterly.

A year ago, on September 30, 1949, the local bank's comparable totals were, deposits, \$3,361,257 and loans, \$2,350,517.

As of September 30 this year, the First National Bank of Portland, with its 45 offices, reported deposits of \$494,634,588, loans of \$217,575,018 and resources of \$536,202,820. Against the loan figure there has been set up of earnings since January 1, 1949, to September 30, 1950, a reserve for possible loan losses in the amount of \$850,679. This reserve is to apply against any loan losses that may develop in the future, and it has not been allocated to any particular loan or type of loan.

By way of comparison, on September 30, 1949, deposits were \$467,876,086, loans, \$157,084,692, and resources \$565,744,252.

In releasing his statewide banking organization's progress figures, Frank N. Belgrano, Jr., president of the First National Bank of Portland, said that the publishing of financial statements quarterly was decided upon as an added service to stockholders, customers and the public generally.

"This system of quarterly statements allows for more convenient and up-to-date consideration of the important data offered," Belgrano said. "This is another example of our bank's policy of being 'first' to provide services to benefit the people of our state."

Further figures show that, as of September 30, the First National Bank group, consisting of 45 First

National offices and 13 affiliated banks with 18 offices, had total combined deposits of \$612,820,167, loans of \$349,215,853 and resources of \$662,443,974. On September 30, a year ago, the First National Bank group had total combined deposits of \$556,506,667, loans of \$182,084,429, and resources of \$611,191,521.

Nyssa Roadbed May Be Widened

Prospects that the section of highway from the west end of Main street in Nyssa to the city limits may be widened to the full street width was indicated this week by the state highway department.

The contract for improvement of the highway from Ontario to Nyssa calls for a 22-foot roadbed between the Nyssa city limits and Main street. The city of Nyssa and chamber of commerce asked the highway department for a 46-foot roadway. State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock stated in a letter to City Manager E. K. Burton that "It has been the policy of the highway commission to widen to full street width only through the business portions of various cities. In the contract for the Ontario-Nyssa improvement, widening to full street width was not included for the portion you are now requesting in Nyssa."

"I will have an immediate investigation made to determine cost and other factors pertaining to this widening and present the matter to the highway commission for its consideration. You will be advised when the commission has taken action on the matter."

The Nyssa residents pointed out in their letters to the highway commission that the section in question has been "improved" during the last year to the point where the indications are that all open land along the highway will be occupied by business concerns.

The district engineer is already making a survey to determine the cost of the proposed widening and will make his recommendations to the highway commission.
