Miss Beulah Corn of Caldwell spent the week-end at her home here.

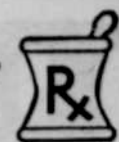

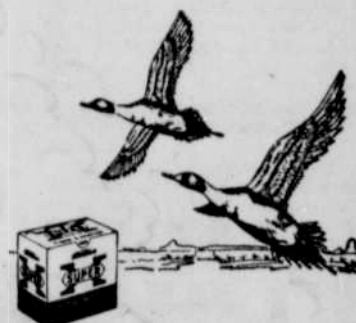
