Children's Bill Gets Support At PTA Gathering

Snider, Jackson Talk; Other Numbers Are Presented

The so-called children's bill, which will appear on the November ballot, was enthusiastically supported in talks made by local residents at the monthly meeting of the Nyssa P. T. A. last Thursday night.

Mrs. Walter McPartland, program chairman, introduced Clifford Mink, legislative chairman, who presented the members of his panel, Clyde Snider and Wilton C. Jackson.

Mr. Snider pointed out that "in years gone by school taxes were raised principally from assessments on real estate in the school district. The state has an infinite variety of means of getting tax money. The law originally was intended to lower the real estate tax so it would not be so heavy on local school districts. There has been some objection to the bill we are going to discuss. Some contend it represents one of the trends that must be restricted. Some say it would result in regimentation and take control out of the school district and place it in Salem. Some call it a vicious fraud because of the title. Calling it socialist is unfair."

"Opponents contend the proposed law will increase state control over the schools, although state help for schools began when the state was formed. Were people socialistic 90 years ago?"

Mr. Snider discussed the attitude of the national chamber of commerce on education. He said the national chamber has endorsed support of education on the state level "because education pays off from the business standpoint."

Businessmen, Snider stated, know if the states fail to give proper support, the federal government will do it and they don't want that. Pointing out that prices have increased, Mr. Jackson said the schools need more money and pointed to the vote of Nyssa district residents to exceed the six per cent limitation. "In 1946 you folks voted to raise state school support from \$30 to \$50 per pupil. All that we are asking now is that the state pay the difference between \$50 and \$80. The bill is not something new; we are just asking for a raise in pay. There are no new strings attached to your schools. You will pay only 45 per cent of the cost of your Nyssa schools. A man in Portland with an \$11,000 house supports one child in school; a man in Nyssa with an \$11,000 house supports over two children in school."

School taxes in Malheur county are now \$712,000. Of this amount, the state paid a little over \$428,000 last year. Under the new bill Malheur county would pay \$48,000 toward school support and the state would pay \$660,000.

Ez Carr and Mel Beck presented a humorous skit promoting sale of the P. T. A. magazine and Mrs. C. W. Buchner and Mrs. K. E. Keever played two piano duets.

With the president, Mrs. John Schenk, presiding, the P. T. A. voted to authorize a committee to consider making arrangements for exhibition of an art display.

After the business meeting, refreshments were served in the home economics room.

Checks Sent To Beet Producers

Checks totaling approximately \$450,000 will be mailed Friday to sugar beet growers in Idaho, Oregon and Utah. H. A. Benning, president of The Amalgamated Sugar Company, announced Wednesday. These checks represent the final payment due on the 1949 crop, with growers in the Nyssa-Nampa district receiving \$305,000; Twin Falls and Burley-Rupert district growers \$115,000 and Utah growers in Cache and Weber counties \$30,000.

This amount brings the total payment to farmers who delivered beets to the company's factories to approximately \$10,750,000 divided as follows: \$15,500,000 to the Nyssa-Nampa district, \$4,150,000 to the Twin Falls and Burley-Rupert district, and \$1,100,000 to the Utah district. Beets delivered from the 1949 crop amounted to slightly more than 1,250,000 tons, which is approximately 400,000 tons below the estimated tonnage that will be harvested in these districts this fall.

Nyssa Boys Win Places At Show

An Angus steer, exhibited by Jack Seburn of Nyssa at the Pacific International Livestock exposition in Portland, won third place in the Angus division.

Seburn, who won fifth place in showmanship, sold the 1050 pound steer for 33 cents a pound. A group of Nyssa boys, Keith Thomas, Minard Hart, Jimmy Hlatt and Earl Barton, entered the judging, but failed to place among the first 115.

Thomas won third place in individual judging among 180 boys from Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Men Are Injured In Accidents In Sunset Valley

SUNSET VALLEY, Oct. 19.—A near tragedy occurred Monday during haying on the Barrett farm, when Dick Wyatt, who was working on a hydraulic tractor, was caught and crushed between two steel beams. The lever was accidentally released while Wyatt was working on the tractor, and the basket lowered with its terrific weight, crushing him between the steel beams. Bud Derrick, who was present, applied artificial respiration and Wyatt was rushed to the Nyssa hospital. Wyatt has blistered lungs and three broken ribs.

Ira Chadd suffered painful injuries to his hand Friday evening while greasing the belt of his tractor. However, the tractor motor "killed" after cutting all of his fingers. His hand needed nine stitches, is badly bruised.

Jim Corfield, oldest son of Chet Corfield, has been confined to his bed for 10 days following an injury received in a football game.

The wheels locked on Seth Kidman's pick-up while he was en route to town Saturday morning for the thousand-mile check-up, and the car ran into the railing on the canal bridge just west of Olaf Pillingness' farm. Kidman was not hurt but the radiator and fenders were damaged.

Pioneer Trails Sponsor Speaks To Nyssa Groups

Walter Meacham Tells Of Trail Passing Near Nyssa

The adventure, the hardships and the successes of the pioneers who crossed the plains to the great northwest in the early part of the 19th century were discussed by Walter E. Meacham of Portland at a luncheon of the Lions club and at an assembly of school students Monday afternoon.

Mr. Meacham, secretary of the Old Oregon Trail, Inc., said the work of his organization is monumental and marking the western trails, especially the Old Oregon Trail, which, he said, has a great history.

"If it had not been for the Oregon Trail civilization would have been delayed 100 years," the speaker said. Tracing the history of the movement of civilization to the west, Mr. Meacham said "the first expedition was made in 1830. It was followed two years later by Bonneville, who brought 20 wagons across the Rockies following the Sweetwater river. In 1834 Jason Lee came by this way (meaning Nyssa) and in 1836 Dr. Marcus Whitman and others brought a cart as far as Fort Boise. It was not until 1840 that the trail was further extended, going to Walla Walla. In 1843 at Fort Hall, the pioneers decided to take their wagons on rather than leave them behind. This was a momentous historic decision. The travelers went passed Parma and Vale, across the Blue mountains and then to the Columbia."

"That gives the highlights of the great American endeavor. The pioneers had a vision of a finer place in which to live. They kept on until they reached their goal, not without cost. You are living on the trail of an empire. It should mean something to you. Is it worth preserving? I know the answer—it is worthwhile. The test of a community is its interest in the things that made the country. That is the thing that counts."

Mr. Meacham told of Ezra Meeker, famous pioneer, who retraced his route over the Oregon Trail in the 20's when he was more than 70 years old. On his trip, the speaker said, "Meeker was selling America to the people. He awakened us to our heritage—what it meant. His work is unfinished and will always be unfinished as long as a new generation springs up. It isn't just my job; it is your job, it is the job of men who are interested in America."

Meacham said his organization has a three-fold purpose—patriotic, educational and commercial. It is affiliated with Pioneer Trails association.

"Every place has a background, a history," the speaker said. "The more we know about our community, the more community-minded we are."

Mr. Meacham, who organized the Oregon Trail association in 1922, has been interested since that time in promoting interest in preserving western history and in marking and monumenting pioneer trails. He has written several books on the pioneer roads to the west.

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Reclamation Men To Talk Contract With Producers

Representatives of the bureau of reclamation will meet with the directors of all the districts on the Owyhee irrigation project in Nyssa Monday afternoon, October 23 to consider a contract between the two groups. The meeting will be held in the veterans hall, beginning at 2 p. m.

Officials of the bureau and the districts will discuss the latest draft of a contract under which the districts will assume operation and maintenance of the project.

The bureau officials will present examples of how the provisions of the contract draft relating to the distribution of power charges and the gravity water supply would have operated in past years had the contract been in effect. Each of the irrigation districts should consider the draft carefully and be prepared at the meeting to indicate its views as to the proposals embodied in the contract and to assist in arriving at a draft acceptable to all the districts concerned, bureau officials said.

UN Discussed By Mrs. Campbell

At a meeting of the Nyssa Civic club Wednesday afternoon at the parish hall, members heard Mrs. Donald S. Campbell tell of the United Nations organization and the accomplishments of that body in the affairs of the world today. Mrs. Campbell outlined the origin at San Francisco five years ago, which had as its purpose "to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights; to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war and to promote social progress and better standards."

Mrs. Campbell explained the organization with its six main organs, the general assembly, the security council, economic and social council, the trusteeship council, international court of justice and the secretariat. Besides these groups there are a number of commissions and specialized agencies that are laying a sound foundation of peace in many fields throughout the world, she said.

Mrs. Campbell told of visiting the trusteeship council of the United Nations at Lake Success this summer and of the thrill of seeing drama enacted as representatives of 12 nations, including the "big five," sought to safeguard the rights of people in some of the areas where self-government had not yet been achieved. She explained that the five official languages of the United Nations are Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish, and that with earphones a person dials to the language he wishes to hear. Mrs. Campbell commented on the skill of interpreters, who instantly interpret the words of the speakers into one of the five languages.

In conclusion, Mrs. Campbell urged that there are several things that could be done by every person to help support the United Nations. Among these are bringing the facts of the accomplishments of the United Nations to the attention of the people, to seek understanding of the countries of the world and their contributions to the world, to exert public opinion that will aid the security council and general assembly to exert more pressure toward the peaceful settlement of disputes, and lastly, to join the people's section of the United Nations whereby for \$1 per year a person may join and monthly receive materials to keep him informed. In this way the opinions of individuals are expressed.

Lewis Discusses Local Phases Of Labor Situation

Sufficient Equipment Available; Beet Crop Reported Good

The farm labor situation, considered very important to all local businesses, has changed rapidly during the last three weeks, according to a statement made by Jared Lewis, district manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company, at a chamber of commerce luncheon Wednesday noon.

Three weeks ago the population of the Nyssa labor camp totaled 800 and today it amounts to slightly over 100. Mr. Lewis said the migration was the greatest in the history of the area. Most of the transients went to southeastern Idaho, where the potato harvest was delayed and a lot of help was needed. Mr. Lewis said "They would have been better off here, but there is nothing we can do about that now."

"Personally I am not alarmed about the labor shortage. A survey of harvesting equipment in the Nyssa district shows there is enough equipment, if fully utilized, to harvest the beets in 23 days. The equipment is not very well distributed, so that the co-operation of the farmers would help. We can get through and I am sure we will."

Mr. Lewis said that really the problem is next year's labor supply. Government recruiting causes labor problems and if war continues the speaker predicted a serious labor shortage in 1951. The Malheur labor sponsors were represented at a meeting held in Portland Wednesday, when the labor situation was discussed.

"This section grows a large variety of crops that require a lot of hand labor," Mr. Lewis said. "To meet the demand, the sugar company has been able to supply a large part of the labor, but if it is necessary to get foreign nationals, the company cannot do that" because of the expense and government "red tape" involved.

The speaker said the sugar beet harvest is progressing satisfactorily, but not as rapidly as last year. The crop is good, with prospects that the average per acre will be at least 20 tons. The sugar content is about the same as in 1949, which was a little below normal.

Mr. Lewis said "We are affected by the unusually warm weather, but we think we can handle the situation."

When questioned, Mr. Lewis said he thinks prospects for securing a state employment office for Nyssa are very good.

While in Omaha, the boys were guests of the Union Pacific Railroad company, with Joe Jarvis, agricultural agent of the railroad company, former Ontario resident, as host.

In Kansas City, Diven also attended the national F. F. A. speaking contest.

Hearing Set For 4 Deer Seasons

A public hearing will be held in the Portland office of the game commission Friday, October 20 to determine if four special deer seasons should be held.

The suggested special seasons would be held in the Silverton hills section, northern Lake county, the Burnt river district in Baker county and the White river area in Wasco county.

The decision to call a public hearing followed closely upon the action of the game commission in eliminating the hunter's choice deer season and extending the general buck season through October 22 in all the state except parts of Lake and Klamath counties, where the interstate deer herd special season is being held. With the elimination of the hunter's choice season it was felt that special seasons should be held in the districts where deer problems are the most urgent.
