Milk Production Drop Is Revealed

Malheur County dairy cows showed a seasonal drop in milk and butterfat production from August to September, according to reports coming to the county agents' office at Ontario. Large numbers of milk cows complete their production year at this season, or are in the advanced stages of lactation, according to Don Anderson, county extension agent.

From dairy herd improvement reports filed at the county office by Don Humble, association supervisor, the 38 herds with 670 cows, tested during September, produced the average of 703 pounds of milk and 31 pounds of butterfat. This compares with the August production of 806 pounds of milk and 35 pounds of fat for 39 herds totalling 706 cows.

During the two months, a total of 38 cows were culled from the 41 different herds. Of this number, 19 different herds tested under the standard plan and 23 different herds were tested by the owner-sampler method.

The following dairymen placed their herds on test during August and September as owner-sampler members: L. R. Grimes, Route 2, Payette; Harold Houston, Route 1, Ontario, and Frank Parr, Route 1, Nyssa.
