

Progress Made On Owyhee Contract

meet as early as practicable and report to the main group.
Bureau of reclamation officials said the existing construction payment of \$2 per acre cannot be continued under the repayment contracts signed in 1926 and 1936, which are currently in force. The new amendatory repayment contract which proposes a \$2.10 per acre construction charge must be obtained prior to the 1951 irrigation season. The group plans to have agreement on a draft contract for presentation to the electors of each of the irrigation districts at an election to be held this fall so that congressional approval can be requested early in the session of congress convening in January.

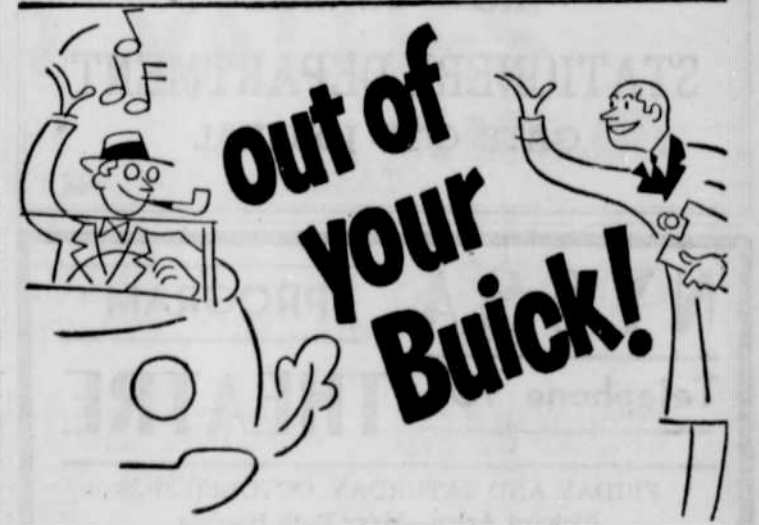
