

Ex-Wave Tells Of Experiences

SUNSET VALLEY, Oct. 26—Mrs. Gene Stephens was guest speaker Thursday afternoon when Worthwhile club members met at the home of Mrs. Claude Wilson. Mrs. Stephens, who served in the U. S. navy as a WAVE for two years, from June 1944 to 1946, told of her experiences. Her account was full of humor and reality as she related how the girls, eight from the Boise area, who were taken to Hunter college in New York for boot-training, were so homesick they cried if they received a letter, and cried if there was no letter. She told of New York sight-seeing, being transferred to the Farragut Naval station and later to Seattle and her work in a naval secretarial job and emergency relief and finally being released five months after the war was over. Besides giving an interesting talk, Mrs. Stephens also had a complete scrapbook of her two years' life as a WAVE.
