

Boise Speaker Tells Of Korea

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Gorton said. "There has been an independence party in Korea since 1900. Because of strike the leaders have moved around the world, but have kept in touch with the nation. The Koreans elect only legislators, who elect a president and the president appoints the supreme court, which has control of all courts in Korea. The government is a strong executive democracy. To my mind, it is a police state. Korea is about the size of Oregon.

"Twenty million people live in the south and 10 million in the north. In the south, there are 500 persons per square mile, as compared to 50 per square mile in the United States. The south is mostly agricultural, raising rice, tobacco and other products. In the northern mountains iron and gold have formed an important part of the economy in the past. Rice is the most important item of food, so rice riots are common. There is nothing in our diet that compares to it. The Koreans also eat some maize and wheat. For proteins, they eat fish and also use eggs and soy beans. They use very little meat because of the scarcity of land. The average Korean depends on one-fourth of an acre of land for his food and over here we have three acres. There is no milk or cheese in the ordinary diet.

"The Koreans like to wear western costumes when they can afford it. Most of the houses are thatched, but are good solid houses with two rooms.

"The monetary system has been extremely inflationary. The basis of the system is the yuen. When I was there it took 2600 yuen to make a dollar. I needed a wheelbarrow to carry my spending money. As a result we did much bartering."

After his general talk, Mr. Gorton showed colored slides depicting living conditions, agricultural methods and other phases of life in Korea.

The Korean program was presented under the leadership of Mrs. Walter McPartland, P. T. A. program chairman.

D. W. Patch gave a test to the teachers and parents in attendance, using Oregon as the basis of the questions. Mrs. Roscoe Barnett sang a solo, accompanied by Mrs. Lloyd Lewis, and led the group in singing one verse of "God Bless America".

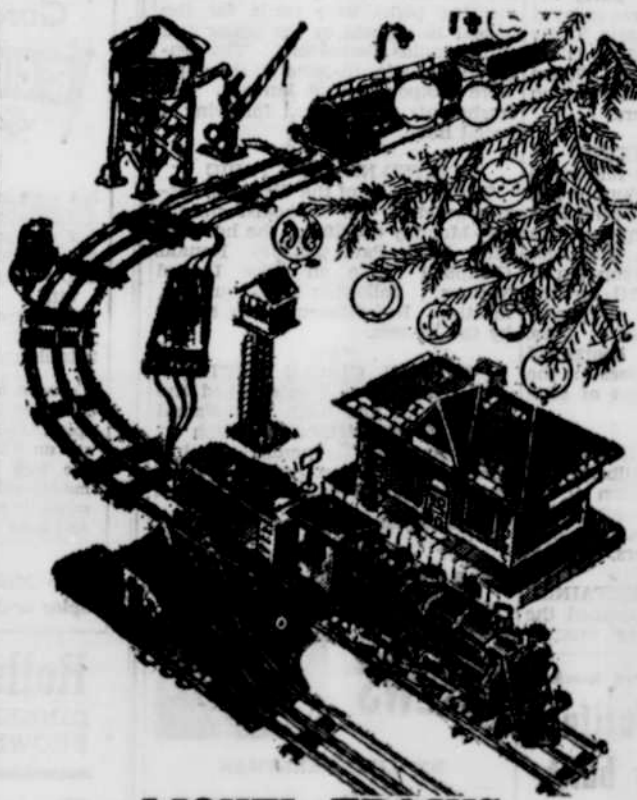
