Many Fossils Are Found In County

Continuing this discussion of the geologic past of the Nyssa general area of Malheur county, we find that an examination of the sedimentary rocks of the area (those laid down under water) reveals two distinct types, as follows:

1—One series older than the local Payette strata.

2—One being younger than the Idaho series.

These sedimentary rocks, which abound in the Mitchell butte and Chalk butte areas, were evidently formed by the setting down of materials weathered from the older rocks, or from the remains of plants and animals once common to this area of eastern Oregon, or precipitated out of solution of water. Sedimentary rocks here locally could also have been created as a result of the decay of igneous, metamorphic or of other sedimentary rocks of previous geologic periods.

Early day bulletins of the Oregon Bureau of Mines and Geology, University of Oregon, Salem, termed the local Payette strata of Malheur county as of Upper Miocene in geologic age, but examinations made here during this summer, reveal that it can well be placed in the Eocene category, based on the re-determination of the plant material found in the strata. The Idaho formation is of Pliocene age and contains fossil mammal remains such as three-toed pygmy horse, etc., which lived here during Pliocene geologic time.

Mitchell Butte Local Geology
In the Mitchell butte area of Malheur county, west of Nyssa, in township 21 south, range 45 east, we see a remarkable erection or uplift which has evidently been extruded from beneath the floor of an ancient sea which covered this area during past geologic periods. The butte is composed in the main of a hard series of sandstones, some of which contain fossil leaf impressions, conglomerates, partly volcanic, and ashly shale series resting upon older series of volcanic lavas of Tertiary geologic origin. Around the base of Mitchell butte in section 12, east side of the butte, some fossil mammal remains in the form of small bones can be found. Fresh water fossils of long vanished sea life, are also fairly numerous in this area of Malheur county.

West of Nyssa in the Mitchell butte area, a series of sandstone, which on being broken open has a distinct petroleum odor, has been found. The odor, however, is more like kerosene or gasoline. Carbon-tetrachloride tests made of this sandstone revealed some drops of oil after the experiment appearing in the top of the bottle.

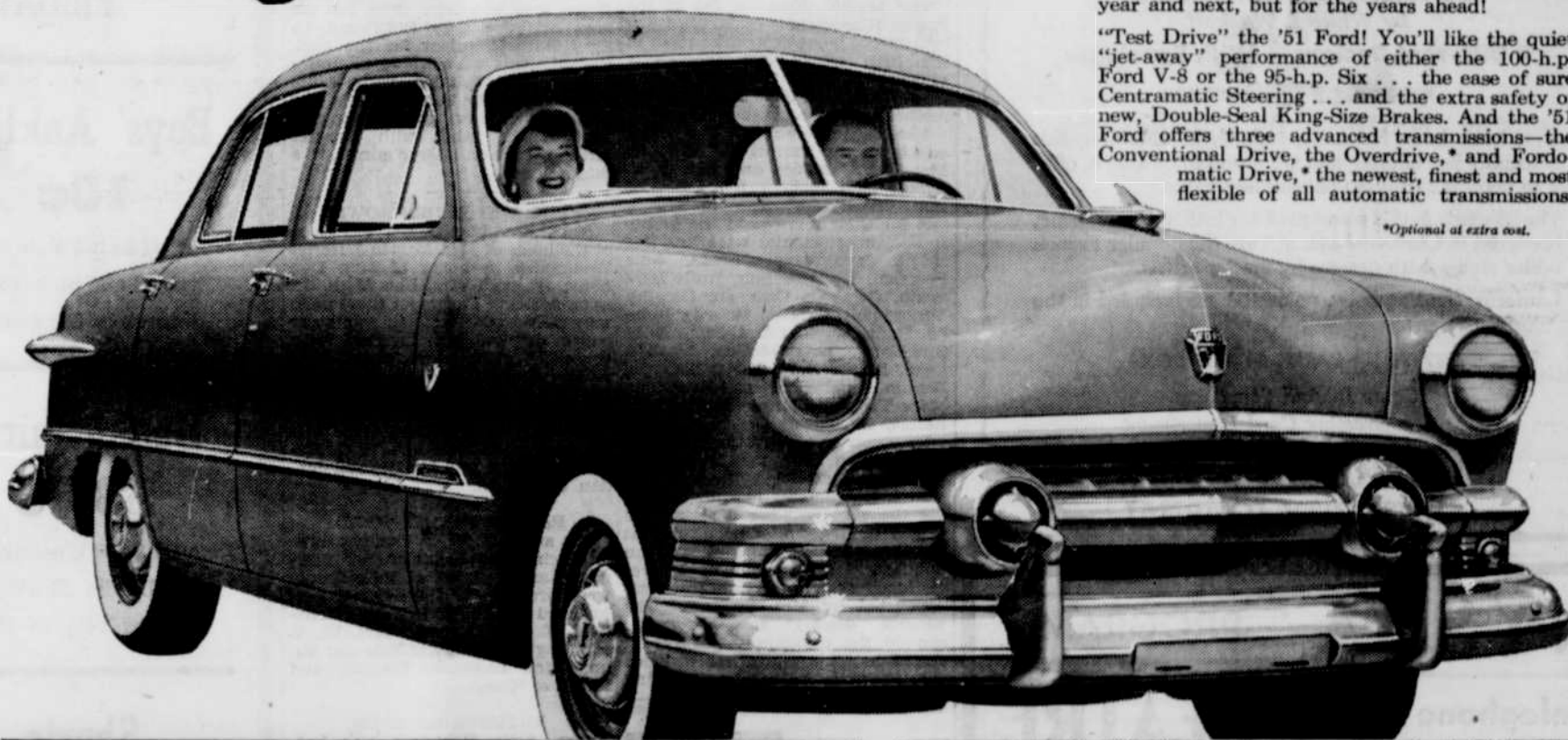

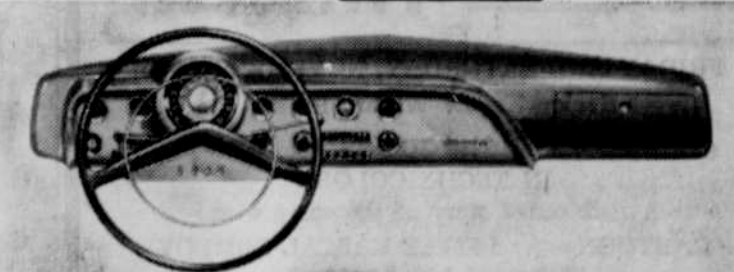
