Rocks Show Nyssa Geologic Periods

From the viewpoint of local geology, one of the most interesting natural history studies of the Nyssa area is the various types of rocks found here, and these tell to the writer and other geologists a complete record of what transpired here during that period of geologic time designated as the Tertiary

epoch. This epoch was the first of two epochs assigned to major Cenozoic geologic time and is broken down as follows:

1—Tertiary "age of Mammals".

2—Quaternary "age of man".

The Tertiary epoch opens here in what is today the Nyssa general area about 100,000 years ago and during this time a strange assortment of grass eating mammals such as camels, rhinoceros, mastodon and mammoth, three-toed pigmy horses, etc., inhabited the Snake River valley. Partial remains of these long vanished forms of prehistoric Tertiary life have been found during past field searches in the Adrian, Mitchell butte and Rock Springs canyon areas of Malheur county.

The major Cenozoic era, of which the Tertiary and Quaternary epochs were geologic divisions, had a longevity of about 150,000 years and during this time eastern Oregon underwent many changes both climatic and topographical. Terrific volcanic eruptions, advance and retreat of ancient seas, etc., all made records here which are today traced by a study of the rocks and fossil remains.

The local metamorphic rocks found in the Nyssa, Adrian, Dunaway and other areas are revealed as alterations of already existing rocks and the transition is a direct result of vast heat and pressure, below the surface of the area, and is rather general in areal scope. The metamorphic rocks could also have been formed as a development from igneous or sedimentary rocks, deposited during earlier periods of eastern Oregon's geologic past.

The igneous rocks here locally are of two distinct types, being fairly predominate in the Rock Springs canyon area, township 21 south, range 45 east. 1—Those which evidently hardened from lava after

it had reached the earth's surface, as in volcanic eruptions and lava flows. These are termed geologically as Extrusive rocks.

2—Those which solidified from magma before it reached the earth's surface, and therefore never did reach the earth's surface while in a molten state, but cooled slowly below forming crystals. These are termed as Intrusive rocks.
