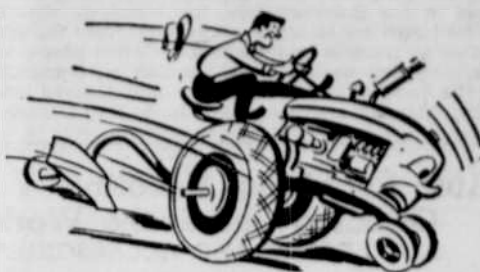

Here From Burns— Rolands S. Davidson and two daughters of Burns were in Nyssa over the week-end. The girls were guest at the D. O. Bybee home.

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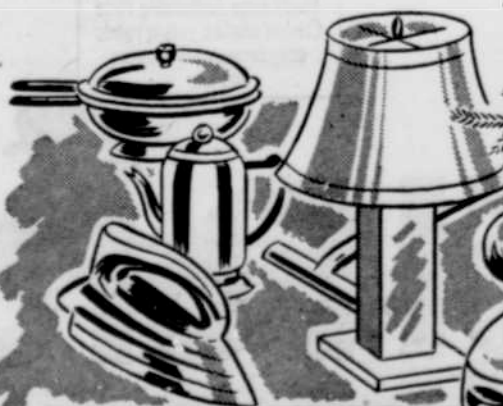
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
