## Mrs. Farris Sees

### Atomic Picture

Mrs. Edna Farris of Vale, county health nurse, has returned from Eugene, where she attended a meeting for supervising nurses, who were privileged to view a showing of an atomic film.

Mrs. Farris said the film, the highlight of the sessions, was a three-reel production borrowed from Fort Lewis. California has one of the five films now in the United States and Oregon is trying to borrow it. Oregon is also trying to buy the film.

Three thousand persons saw the film December 7 and 8 in Eugene. All the firemen, policemen, nurses and doctors in the area viewed the film as well as lay people. The film is highly technical, but is designed for the lay public.

"Our request is going in from the Malheur county public health department today asking for the film. We do not know when we can get it, but we want our request in early because every adult in the county should see it. It is a terrific thing, showing the devastation of the bombed area, actual cases of injured Japanese, and how to protect oneself from the destructive rays. If and when we secure the film we hope to give it wide publicity so that everybody will have an opportunity to see it."

Mrs. Farris was asked to sit in on a panel on "The Role of the Supervising Nurse in the Utilization of Volunteer Workers". She also participated in group discussion on the subject, "Organization of Volunteer Workers". Every health department in the state was represented at the meeting by one or more public health nurses, who were also briefed on the state organization of civil defense "as far as it has gone, which isn't very far".

The dinner, terminating a county-wide membership drive, was attended by membership teams from the Adrian, Annex, Nyssa and Willowcreek centers. stationed at San Angelo, Texas with the air force. Mrs. Coley, and Carol Honey will return to Nyssa next week.

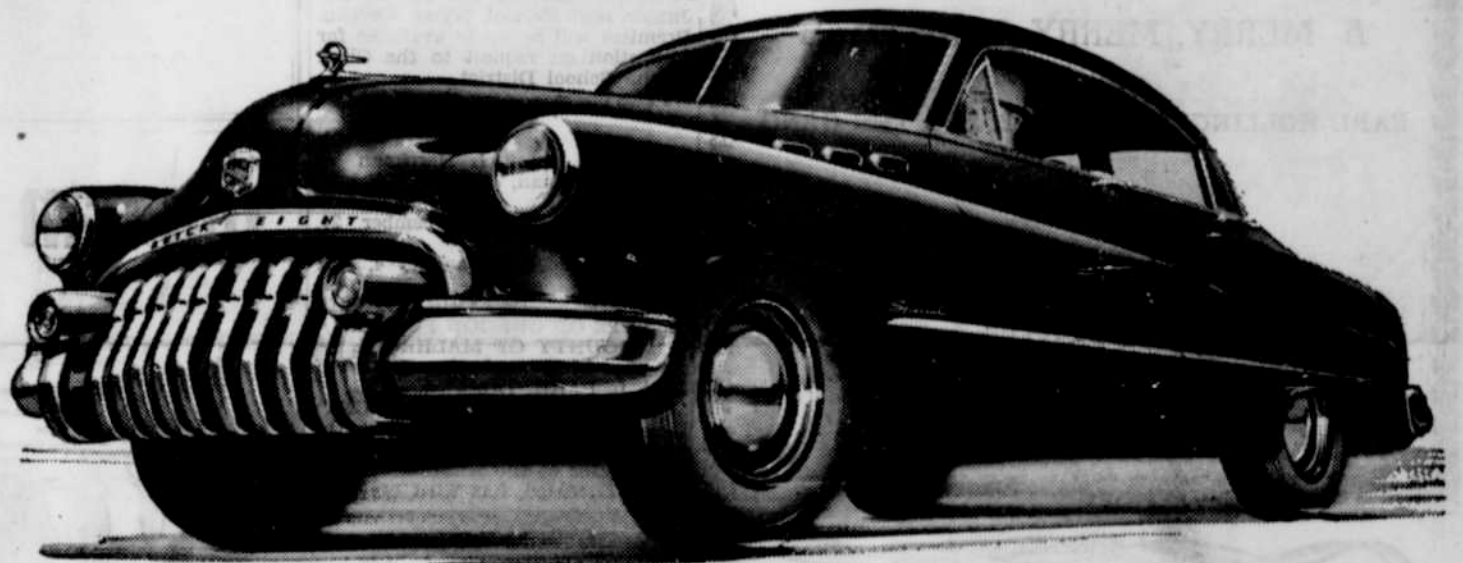

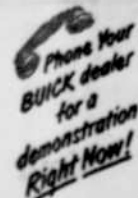
