Mr. Hamer pointed out that the history of Oregon is replete with instances of waste of natural resources, which, he said, are inseparable, with all depending upon the same things. Hunting and fishing in Oregon and the rest of the United States is big business. In 1948, the last year with available figures, 57,000 buck deer were legally killed in Oregon. The deer is just one of the forms of wildlife in the state.

"However, the money value is the least and the recreational value is the greatest. Conservation is very inclusive. It extends into many fields. Conservation means wise use and not just saving for the next generation or for eternity. Foresters have coined the phrase 'sustained yield'. They arrange the forest resources so that in so many years they can go back and harvest a known number of board feet. Game resources can be handled in the same way, but we must have a sound, scientific management program".

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could be obtained in this way. Spread of mosaic in potatoes was not greatly affected by insect control.

Hans C. Hess of the Denver office of the P. M. A. fruit and vegetable branch explained the operation of potato marketing agreement orders. He pointed out that market agreements are tools for growers to use in controlling the marketing of their own crop, and that regulations imposed are first recommended by grower representatives on the marketing agreement committees.

Growers who are prevented under market orders from selling as large a portion of their crops as the average for their area may apply to the manager of the market order area for permission to sell potatoes that are restricted, Hess indicated.

Other speakers on the program included Alfred Edgar, who dis-

cussed storage research carried out at East Grand Forks, Minnesota. Howard Fuji, Welser, explained progress of the recently organized Idaho-Oregon onion growers association; Turner Bond, county extension agent, outlined the program of test plots and trials to be carried out under the new potato improvement program. Tom Pratt of Nyssa discussed current developments and future prospects for securing harvest labor for handling 1951 crops. Ben Davidson, potato commission administrator, Redmond, pointed out the problems in packaging, with jute bags being high in price and a prospect of short supply. He reported some promise in the use of cardboard containers now being tested in central Oregon.
