Hospital Shows Profit Of \$212

Days were 922 and the average patients per day were 10, with total admissions for the 92 operating days of 223. Death numbered four and births 64. Other figures were polio patients, four; total surgical patients, 48; X-ray studies, 77; and laboratory procedures, 498. Total employees on the payroll January 15 were 25.

President Fischer said that "We have made considerable progress during the last year. We raised an additional \$100,000 and finally opened the hospital October 7. I think we have done exceptionally well. To finish the hospital we had to give a 15-year mortgage for \$60,000. At five per cent interest, we were able to negotiate a loan from the Connecticut Mutual Insurance company. We are to pay off the loan in four quarterly payments a year. We hope the hospital will be able to pay off the mortgage from operating expenses.

"We owe the ladies auxiliary a big vote of thanks for what they did for the opening of the hospital last fall. The founders service organization under the direction of Fred Bracken is doing a fine job. "We figured on a deficit these last three months, instead of showing a profit. What the future holds for us we don't know. With the start we have, we hope the hospital will carry its own weight.

Harold Henigson, local attorney, explained the appearance of two mechanics liens that have been filed against the hospital, one by Leslie W. Stoker, general contractor, for approximately \$35,000, and the other by the Ontario Asphalt Paving company, a sub-contractor for \$3200.

At the time of the filing of the lien by Stoker, approximately \$28,000 remained unpaid on the hospital contract. Of this sum, approximately \$1000 was being held by the hospital to cover the cost of various unfinished items under the contract and the balance was available for payment to Mr. Stoker. Since then, authorization has been given by Stoker to the hospital association to pay the \$27,000 directly

to various unpaid sub-contractors, among them the Ontario Asphalt Paving company, for whom authorization to the extent of \$3000 was received. The \$27,000 has subsequently been paid.

In filing the mechanics liens, Stoker included over and above the balance due on his contract about \$6000 as additional compensation for delay in completion of the hospital. No suit has been instituted as yet on either of the liens and unless suit is instituted within six months of the filing of the liens they will be of no force and effect, Henigson said.

The sub-contractor's lien, in any event, will be protected by the surety bond filed by the United States Fidelity and Guarantee company on behalf of Stoker. The directors of the hospital have stated that the contract was not breached in any respect by the hospital association and that no claim on Stoker's part is justified.
