

## Company Signs RFC Lease On Facility

The Oregon Frozen Foods company affected a lease agreement Tuesday with the Reconstruction Finance corporation on the former Bridgford plant in Ontario. The lease will run through 1951 and the first part of 1952.

The company is enlarging its operations this year to twice the business done in 1950. During the 1950 season, the payroll amounted to \$107,000 and payments to growers totaled \$206,000. Along with the operating season, the company is laying plans for the purchase of the large plant when the foreclosure sale is affected, company officials said.

"The Oregon Frozen Foods company feels that this plant has a tremendous bearing on the economy of this community and that they can develop it to a full-scale operation," officials said. "We have received the full support of merchants and growers and we look ahead to a very bright future."

The company is owned by local business men consisting of Grigg Brothers and Butler, J. Blaine Holladay, Otis Williams, P. J. Gallagher, Glenn E. Call, Ken Inahara, Tom Komo, Earl M. Burton and Evan P. Gheen, Jr. P. Nephri Grigg is acting as president and general manager; Golden T. Grigg is vice president and assistant manager; Evan P. Gheen, Jr., assistant manager; Glenn E. Call, secretary and treasurer; J. Blaine Holladay, field supervisor and production manager; Earl M. Burton, plant superintendent; Otis Williams, assistant plant superintendent; P. J. Gallagher and Ken Inahara, other members of the board, and Dora Nelson, office manager.

The Oregon Frozen Foods company has scheduled a capacity run of sweet corn for this season for fresh, frozen and canned markets. The concern will place a large cannery in operation this season, also. It is now signing contracts on a straight price of \$25 per ton until their requirements are met, and is planning to process other available fruits and vegetables in the area, including a limited acreage of spinach for an early processing run.

The library is also seeking copies of Field and Stream and Outdoor Life, which are popular as reading material by many of the boys in school.
