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Performance Held
Christian Need

"Profession without performance
leads to favor with Christ," declared
Rev. Austin J. Hollingsworth,
pastor of the First Church of Christ,
in his Monday night sermon at the
special Passion week evangelistic
services now in progress in the local
church at Fifth street and Route
avenue.

"The penalty of hypocrisy is de-
struction," declared the local pastor

as he told the story of Monday in
Passion week. "On this day our
Lord and his disciples returned from
their night's rest in the nearby
Bethany. Palm Sunday had been
a day of tremendous import. For
a single day Jesus had accepted the
plaudits of men, as if he were an
earthly king. The crowd had strewn
his way on the previous morning,
our Palm Sunday, with quickly
gathered palm branches from the
overhanging trees along his pro-
cessional into Jerusalem. It had
been a day of earthly triumph. But
the voices of the multitude were

more quiet as the new King Jesus
and his retinue of 12 apostles made
their morning journey into the city
of Jerusalem. On this Monday Jesus
began the steep ascent to His cross.
His early morning hunger caused
him to reach upward into the leafy
branches of a roadside fig tree. But
there were no figs. The tree was
hypocritical. So the Christ started
it."

"The rank critics of Christian-
ity have declared that act of Jesus
to be a whimsical expression be-
neath the dignity of the Son of
man. They have declared that act
of Jesus to be unjustified. In
addition they have said he destroyed
property which did not belong to
him. I venture this answer to these
criticisms. Jesus declared the minis-
ter-evil. With fig trees the fruit
appears first. The leaves come after
the fruit has set on. The leaves of
this tree indicated that there should
be fruit. It was therefore appro-
priate. This week Jesus was coming
to lead Israel for the last time.
He had sought fruit from the sons
of David, his great ancestor, and
found only empty profession. And
the tree grew along the roadside and
according to Jewish law was com-
mon property. Jesus appropriated
this tree as a great object lesson
intended to help induce a moral
reform in Israel's decadent religion.
The tree had accepted sustenance, air
and moisture laden with from the
hand of the infinite God and had
given only leaves. It had abused
its stewardship. God's condemnation
rests on selfishness. A like curse
rests on everyone who accepts the
benefits of Christian environment
and renders back no service to the
Christian religion that has made
possible the great privileges we to-
day enjoy."

A delegation of three cars of
people from the Meridian Christian
church were present. They were
headed by their minister, Rev. E.
W. Powell, who delivered the even-
ing prayer. Mrs. Don Moore, direc-
tor of the Ontario Christian church
choir, sang two choruses and directed
the song service. Other members
of the Ontario church were present
as well as members from the Church
of God. These evangelistic meetings
will carry over Easter morning,
with an afternoon baptismal service,
and close with a candlelight
service Easter night. Twenty per-
sons will participate in a colorful
march to the "Victorious Cross," a
pageant prepared by Rev. Hollings-
worth.

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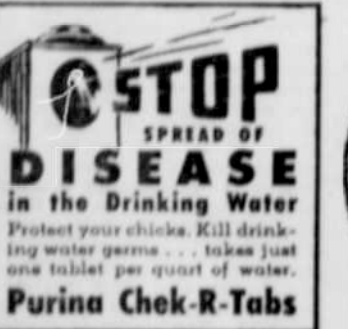

Gordon's Drive-In
RECIPE OF THE WEEK
By Mary Lee Taylor
Easter Ham Dinner
Broadcast: March 17, 1951

2 cups cooked rice
4 medium carrots, cooked
1 can condensed cream of mush-
room soup
2/3 cup Sego Milk
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
2 tablespoons finely cut onion
1 lb. ground ham, smoked or cooked
1 cup bread crumbs (2 days old)
1/3 cup catsup or chili sauce
1 teaspoon dry mustard
2 tablespoons water

Cut carrots in half lengthwise; ar-
range on bottom of greased 1 1/2-qt.
loaf pan. Mix rice, 1/2 cup mushroom
soup, 1/4 cup milk, salt, pepper and
onion. Press lightly on carrots in pan.
Top with mixture of ham, crumbs,
catsup, 1/2 cup milk and mustard.
Bake in moderately slow oven (350)
1 hour, or until brown. Remove from
oven; loosen sides of loaf with knife.
Let stand 10 min. Heat rest of mush-
room soup with water until steaming
hot. Turn out loaf; serve with the
mushroom sauce. Makes 4 servings.
