The town exists because of the farmers, but we feel the town has a purpose in addition to extracting money from our neighbors. Nearby towns make markets and provide shipping points for the farmers. The town also furnishes a place for shopping, provision for machinery repairing and other commercial activities as well as act as a cultural, educational and recreational center.
