ed as spokesman for the group. Duus said the average butterfat production of all cows in Denmark is 370 pounds, compared to about 260 pounds for all Oregon cows. About 80 percent of all cows in Denmark are on production tests as compared to about three percent in the United States. Duus is living with the Earl Paw family at Vale, Bun- nar Rider is living with Anker Jensen family on Ontario heights and Arne Pihl is with the Hugh McConnell family near Willowcreek.

Anderson said these Danish young men will be in Malheur county until the middle of July, at which time an exchange will be made with three other young European farmers from another country. The latter will live with these same families until mid-October.
