The barns on the fairgrounds are completely filled and overflowing, despite the construction of a 120 by 30 foot barn since last year. The quality of the livestock exhibited has been improved each year and this year is no exception, said Neil Hoffman, superintendent of the fair. The number of Jerseys in the open class is nearly double that of last year. The number of hog and sheep exhibits is the greatest in history. Five Granges and the Farm

Bureau are competing in the booth contest. They are the Oregon Trail, Ontario Heights, Vale, Oregon Slope and Willowcreek Granges and the Malheur county Farm Bureau. Clubs, organizations and individuals having booths include Sheaville school district No. 27, Mr. and Mrs. William Clevenger, Lincoln Heights club, Ontario Heights Thursday club, Ontario Good Neighbors club, Malheur County 4-H leaders council, the Malheur County Holstein Breeders association and the Girl Scouts. Other display booths were arranged by the Vale Christian church, Lutheran church of Ontario, and Malheur County Tuberculosis and Health association. In the armory are two garden

club exhibits entered by the ANK Garden club of Nyssa and the Ontario Garden club. The displays also include Boy Scouts exhibit, Ontario national guard weapons and much needlework, handicrafts, flowers, canning, 4-H home economics material, art and photography.

The farm machinery and implement display is among the largest in the area. The fair board has set up a 100 by 60 circular judging tent. Most of the livestock judging will be done in this tent.

The judges are as follows: Flowers, Warren-Carnefix of Payette; land products, Roland Schaad, former county agent of Union county; beef animals, Leslie J. Marks, county agent of Wheeler county; dairy cattle, E. J. Johannesen, county extension agent of Gem county, Idaho; dual purpose and some dairy animals, Joe Pritzel of Payette; arts and crafts, Mrs. Helen Wilson of Payette, and swine and sheep, LeRoy Fuller, agricultural agent of the Union Pacific railroad.

Radio station KSRV held a special talent show contest Tuesday night between 7 and 8 o'clock and will entertain again tonight from 7 to 8 and Friday from 4 to 5 p. m. The F. F. A. and 4-H fat stock sale will be held Friday night, when an auction will be held under the auspices of the Malheur County Livestock association, beginning at 7 o'clock.

Presentation of trophies and other awards will be started at 2 p. m. Saturday in the main exhibit hall. All exhibits will be released at 6 p. m. Saturday. Pari-mutuel racing and arena entertainment will be conducted under the auspices of the Sage and Saddle club of Ontario tonight and Friday and Saturday nights, beginning at 8 o'clock. The entertainment will include cow cutting, flag race, pony race, trailer race, showing of pleasure class horses and tractor driving contest.
