Sagehen, Antelope Hunts Successful

Field checks by game agents in the southeastern Oregon sagehen and antelope ranges indicate one of the most successful sagehen seasons enjoyed in many a year by Oregon sportsmen.

Hunters checked in Malheur county averaged four sagehens apiece, the daily bag limit, and in Lake and Harney counties the ave-

rage was 1.5 birds per day. Sagehens were found in abundance and hunters reported the first day of the season provided the fastest shooting. Thereafter, the big grouse proved wary and difficult to approach.

Final tally on the antelope hunt will be made after hunters return their tags, but field checks summarized by Bill Lightfoot, southeastern Oregon regional game supervisor, showed 80 per cent success in Malheur county and 50 per cent success in Lake and Harney counties.

Lightfoot described the antelope hunt just concluded September 5 as a real trophy getting event. Each hunter had to go out and stalk his animal this year. Hunters themselves expressed pleasure over the conduct of the hunt.

Until this antelope season, hunters concentrated on a few well-known areas, surrounding and "flock" shooting the milling pronghorns, with cars and planes often used to haze the animals. This season hunters drew antelope permits by areas. A concentration of nimrods was eliminated by this dispersion into three separate hunting areas, and antelope bands in areas such as the remote Trout Creek mountains had to match wits with hunters for the first time this year.

Another new rule prohibited shooting at antelope within 50 yards of a vehicle or plane. Game violations during the sagehen and antelope season were at a minimum, with the 20 cases reported mainly on over-limits of sagehens. Only one incident on the use of a car in hunting antelope was reported.

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Let's look back on those "good old days"—to 1926, a fairly normal year. Since then, most prices have varied greatly. By 1951, farm products cost over twice as much as in 1926, groceries and clothing about two-thirds more. But in 1951, gasoline

costs almost as little as it did in 1926—actually up less than 4%, except for taxes, now 6¢ to 8¢ a gallon in the West. Most people's income has gone up enough in those years so that gasoline takes a far smaller share of their budget. So gasoline today—far from being "too high"—is an exceptionally good buy.
