Varied Books Are Shown At Library

The new books this week at the Malheur County library include books of inspirational content, others about wholesome family living, titles bearing on the current scene, one book of fiction by a literary artist, and one for pure entertainment. These books will be on display until

Saturday, December 15, when they will then go into circulation.

"A Man Called Peter" by Catherine Marshall is the story of Peter Marshall, the minister who spoke the language of the people yet with a poetic sense of which most people are incapable. This man had a dynamic faith and lived by it. He was serving as chaplain of the U. S. senate at the time of his early death. A companion volume is "Mr. Jones, Meet the Master" in which the vigor and the poetry of Peter Marshall's sermons and the brevity and meaningfulness of his prayers are evident.

Two other books which belong together are "Man of the Family" by Ralph Moody and his earlier "Little Britches". The latter, a story of family life and the difficulties of life on a Colorado homestead, is carried

on in "Man of the Family", which tells how the Moodys make a valiant effort to support themselves after the father dies.

Another pair of books about a man who has been much in the public eye is John Gunther's "The Riddle of MacArthur" and a newer book about the recent controversy, "The General and the President", by Richard Rovere and Arthur M. Schlesinger, Jr., which analyzes this country's foreign policy.

Thomas Mann, the well-known German writer, has now produced a retelling of a medieval legend about Gregory who, after atoning for his sins unknowingly committed, became pope. He calls this tale "The Holy Sinner".

On the lighter side, Barbara Webster's "A Horse of Her Own" is laid in the Pennsylvania hill country where Madge Paris finally realizes an old ambition to get a horse, which (as it turns out) proves to have a mind of its own.
