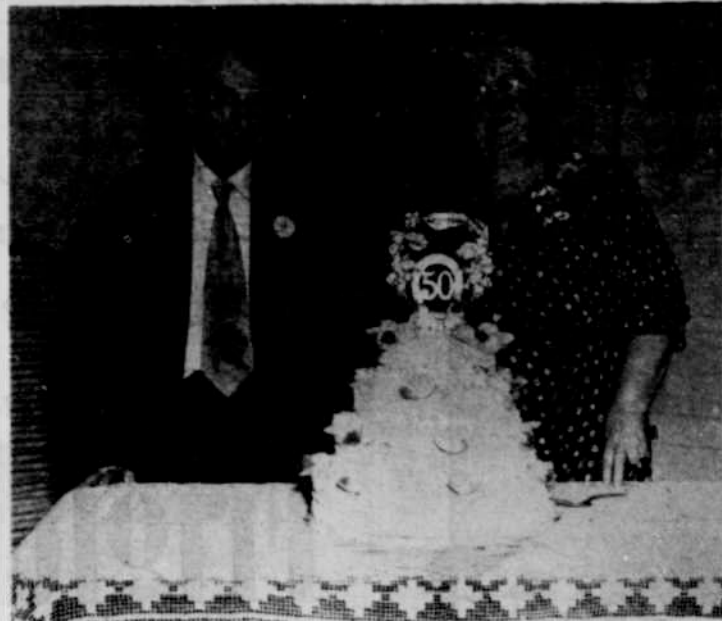

On Wednesday evening, November 28 at 6:30 at the community house in Parma, 15 members of the class of 1897 and their wives and husbands and their teacher, Mrs. Edna J. Boone of Boise, gathered to help celebrate the 50th wedding anniversary of two of the class, Harvey and Myrtle Stark Hatch, pioneer residents of Big Bend.

Guests came from Boise, Payette, Caldwell, Wilder, Nyssa, Gaston and Umatilla, Oregon for the occasion. Seven members of the class were unable to attend. Each one sent his regrets and wished to be remembered to each one present, especially the former teacher, Mrs. Edna Boone.

After the 250 persons in attendance had been seated, Dr. Hayman of Caldwell announced that the class of 1897 and those who attended the Stark-Hatch wedding November 28, 1901 would like to have Mrs. Margie Stark McCrae, who played the wedding march 50 years ago, play for them again. Following Mrs. McCrae's piano solo, Dr. Hayman, who was one of the class, told of the pioneering and early school days, when only a "handful of people" resided on the Roswell bench.

The Hatch family went to Roswell from Zilla, Washington in 1892. The Stark family moved there in April, 1897 from Minnesota. The following summer, Will Hatch and Harvey Hatch built the little new school-house. In the fall of 1897 the Hatch and Stark young folks attended school there, along with the Carlyles, Bacons, Allens, Murrays, Pecks, Days, Hudsons and Hayman. 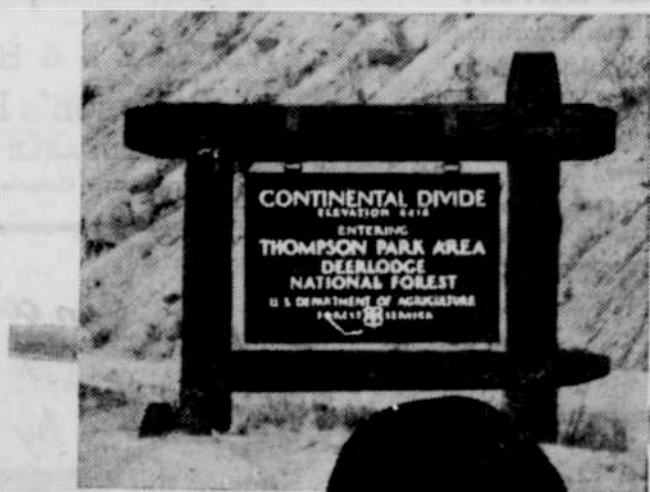

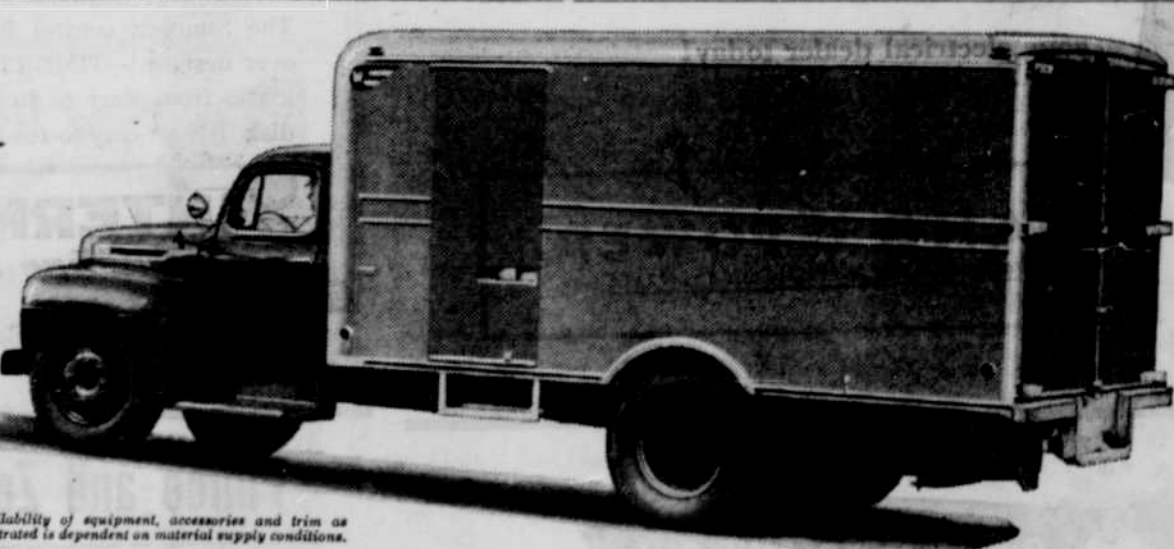
