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MUSIC DESERVES SUPPORT

Nyssa will be host to nearly 1000 high school musicians of 10 Snake River Valley high schools Tuesday and Wednesday of next week and on Wednesday at 8 p. m. these youngsters will appear in a public concert in the gymnasium under the direction of some of the finest directors in the Pacific northwest.

Walter Hantah, who will direct the band, is supervisor of music of the Vancouver, Washington public schools. Keith Forney, who will direct the girls glee club, teaches vocal music at the University of Idaho. The director of the mixed chorus, Crawford Gates, is a professor of music at Brigham Young university of Provo, Utah. The same plan will be followed Thursday and Friday at Emmett, with the other six members of the Snake River Valley School Activities association participating.

We sometimes wonder if the residents of Nyssa realize the scope of this event. It is probably the most thrilling spectator event that any of us will have the opportunity of witnessing during the year. There is nothing quite like it in either Washington, Oregon or Idaho.

The activities association subsidizes the clinic annually in amounts varying from \$200 to \$400. The entire expenses run to about \$1200. It is not necessary for a person to be a musician to appreciate the project, which deserves the support of all of us. In this day of over-emphasis on athletics, it is heartening to know that our school people are interested in other phases of youth development. A good many more of our youngsters participate in music than in athletics. The main objectives of the clinic are achieved during the two days the youngsters work with these outstanding teachers. The concert is merely "window dressing" and is presented largely to help pay the bills.

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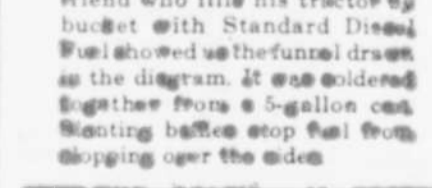
