Antelopes Lose

11th League Tilt

Coach "Nig" Larson's Adrian five lost their 11 conference game Friday, February 8 to the first place Middleton Vikings 67-52. The four-ridden game saw Adrian score seven points before the Vikings managed to get into the scoring column. As the first period ended Adrian was in front 19-14. The Antelopes' defense tightened in the second period and their offense clicked as they pulled into a 34-28 halftime margin. The halftime rest proved disastrous to Adrian as a peppy Middleton five came out for blood in the third period and the Adrian boys could not hit the hoop. Middleton had pulled into a 46-41 lead as the third quarter ended. Middleton's Post got "red hot" in the final stanza and led his teammates out to win the game. Post, Middleton guard, took scoring honors for the evening with 28 counters. Schiemer scored 20 points for the losers.

In the Fresh-Soph preliminary game, Middleton came from behind in the final period to dump Adrian 41-33.

Adrian is planning the trip to Union, Oregon, where they will compete in the District "B" Tournament to be held March 6, 7, and 8th. Nine players, Coach "Nig" Larson, and Manager Wayne Roberts will make the trip.

Last place Notus edged Adrian 42-41 on the Adrian floor to swing the Antelopes down to seventh place with no hopes of any better spot. The loss left Adrian with a four wins, 10 loss record in league play with just two league games remaining and those games are with first place Middleton and third place Homedale.

The first quarter passed very quickly with both teams scoring consistently as the first period ended 11-11. With 30 counters by Iverson, Notus guard, the Pirates managed to gain a 19-15 halftime advantage. The third quarter saw Adrian outscore Notus and Adrian pull to within three points of the score-happy Pirates. In the fourth quarter neither team scored until three minutes had passed and then both teams scored at a terrific pace with Adrian holding the scoring edge. With 2 1/2 minutes remaining Adrian had managed to go ahead 41-40. Bollinger, Notus center, then sank a field goal from 10 feet out to give Notus the needed two points and the game. Bowers earned 20 points to take scoring honors for the evening. In the fresh-soph preliminary game the Adrian five smothered Notus 39-28. Woods took scoring honors dumping in 12 points for the locals.

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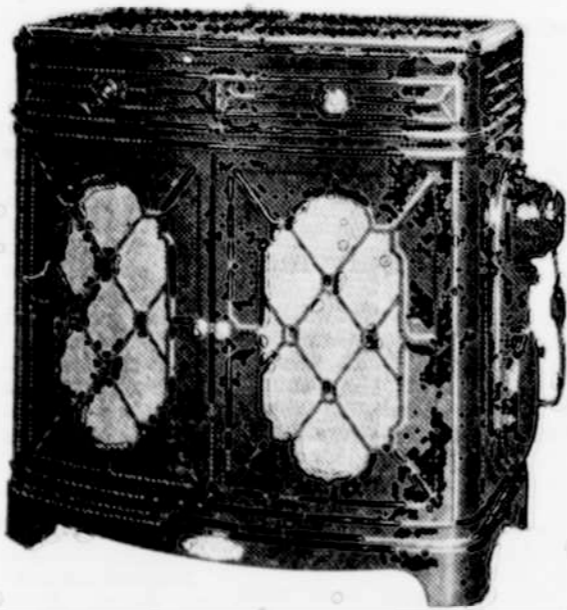
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
