Brainard Says Power Furnished

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They are different. Estimates of engineers on the power production are very close for the two methods. The capacity at Hell's Canyon is estimated at 592,000 kilowatts. The down-stream benefits are estimated at 262,000 kilowatts or a total of 854,000 kilowatts. The only difference in the two plans would be the down-stream benefits. Based on the over-all cost, the rates for the down-stream benefits would be ridiculous.

Later during the question period, Brainard said construction of the five low-head dams would not destroy the down-stream benefits.

"A lot of figures are being bandied about that are attractive, but are not documented," Brainard said. "When we of the Idaho Power company talk, we are expected to present very definite facts. The proponents of Hell's Canyon dam claim benefits from flood control. The Snake river is already a controlled river. There are over 80 dams that do stabilize the flow of the river. Flood control should be effected on the rivers that are contributing to the floods.

"Dams down-stream could be tied in with the Bonneville grid much easier than Snake river dams. I think Hell's Canyon dam should be the last one built.

"You hear a lot about a 2 1/2 mill rate, but it goes to the aluminum companies, which are entitled to the low rate. That is not the rate of the Bonneville power administration to other customers.

"Estimates indicate that to amortize the half billion dollar cost of Hell's Canyon dam is 55 years the government would have to charge 4.4 mills per kilowatt. We are delivering some power at 3.9 mills so the 4.4 mill power is not cheap power. Bonneville has not projected into this area for two reasons: There has been no need for more power and there has been no artificial requirement, such as the aluminum industry, here. If you needed more power you would demand it."

Brainard said the government plan includes \$120,000,000 for construction of transmission lines down to the Bonneville grid.

After the completion of the formal talk, Brainard answered questions for more than half an hour.
