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Loan Association Elects Officers

The Payette National Farm Loan association re-elected James H. Young of Fruitland and Oscar Stout of Weiser as directors at a meeting held Thursday. Mr. Young is president of the group, William T. Downs of Ontario, vice president, and Herbert J. Davis, Payette, secretary-treasurer.

One hundred and fifty members and guests from Payette, Washington and Adams counties in Idaho and Malheur county in Oregon were in attendance.

The local P. E. O. members served the dinner and furnished entertainment during the noon hour.

Henry Matthew, president of the Federal Land Bank of Spokane, told the Payette group the land bank system had never been in better financial condition and that the volume of farm loans on the Spokane bank's books totaled \$66 million. The bank has loans in Oregon, Washington, Montana and Idaho.

Arnold Anderson, regional manager, also gave a short talk. The secretary reported that 1951 had been the most successful year in its history, that it again paid a 5 per cent dividend to its stockholder borrowers and had added substantially to its reserves.

Ballad Singer to Appear in Ontario

Susan Reed, popular American ballad singer, will appear in Ontario, Wednesday, February 27, for a concert to be given in the Centre theatre under the auspices of the Malheur County Community Concert association.

Singing the traditional ballads of the Appalachians, Ireland and Scotland, Susan Reed has captivated the public with her music and her enchanting personality, and she is one of the most widely booked singers under the direction of Columbia Artists' management, said the sponsors. Miss Reed plays her own accompaniments, alternating on several instruments, including the Irish harp, the zither and the "ever-lovin'" a lute-like instrument she found high up in a village in the Smoky mountains.

The pretty red-haired girl, who was discovered in a New York supper club, has recently made her first motion picture, "Glamour Girl" and her recordings, issued by RCA Victor, are best sellers.

Miss Reed's repertory includes more than 300 traditional songs, many of which she has recorded for the Library of Congress. Alan Lomax, America's leading authority on folksongs, and formerly director of folksongs at the Library of Congress, said recently in introducing Susan Reed to a Town Hall audience in New York: "Miss Reed's songs are a Garland of the greatest things in our whole Anglo-American folk tradition." After a record-breaking engagement at New York's famous Cafe Society Downtown, Miss Reed made her concert debut in New York's Town Hall in November, 1946. It was an immediate success and she gave a second recital in Chicago, where Claudia Cassidy, critic of the Chicago Tribune, reported: "She creates a pool of enchantment, and is the heroine of every song she sings."

Last season Miss Reed made her fourth transcontinental concert tour singing more than 60 concerts. This season she is booked for almost 100 concerts.

Heat Lamp Use for Chicks Revealed

The use of infra-red heat lamps, in place of brooders for baby chicks, is being demonstrated at the Tobler's Feed & Fuel store.

This newest development in brooding baby chicks will make it possible for persons to raise as many as 100 chicks without any special equipment, other than the heat lamp and a small pen.

Hugh Tobler, manager of Tobler's Feed & Fuel, explained that the use of the heat lamp has been thoroughly tested by the poultry research department of Ralston Purina company, and is being recommended for the small poultry raisers as well as for farmers whose flocks are of commercial size.

enough to give the baby chick ample room, can use the heat lamp in place of the traditional brooder," Tobler said. "The lamp, placed in the center of the pen, will provide all the necessary warmth to keep the birds comfortable and healthy."

"We have fixed up a typical pen, with 25 baby chicks in it and have placed it in the store. We will use only one 250-watt heat lamp, and whether the temperature rises or falls, the chicks will have enough heat."

The use of the heat lamp, he continued, will enable a lot of folks to raise chickens without the heavy investment of brooders and similar equipment. One lamp can take care of as many as 70 chicks, he added.

Maulding Tells Bad Drug Effects

dian origin. It grows wild in practically every state in the union. Twine, rope, hats, paper, seeds and bird food, oil for paints, soap, linoleum and fertilizer are some of its products. Every state and every community is cursed with peddlers who are attempting to lure youthful victims with cigarettes containing marijuana, a dangerous and powerful narcotic that leads with absolute certainty to degeneracy and criminality.

There are necessary laws against all habit-forming drugs, but parents have no right to assume that the job of preventing the sale of these drugs belongs solely to the public authorities, said Dr. Maulding. The way to spike the use of dope is to tell the full facts to growing children. Not an untrue statement is needed. The truth is so horrible and so terrifying in itself a serious and careful explanation of what happens or may happen to those who even experiment with these pernicious drugs is sufficient.

Dr. Maulding told of the terrible effects of the drug, especially on youth, and cited crimes that were traced to use of marijuana. Practically every major school scandal in the last few years and several killings in which young persons have been involved have been traced to this drug.

"The abuse of marijuana by school children, vagrant youths, criminal characters of the underworld and various irresponsible individuals is now a recognized menace," the speaker said. "It has increased the occupancy of the country's penitentiaries, and insane asylums and added greatly to the cost of crime prevention. It has a general debasing effect on the moral standards of every city and town."

"Medical experts agree on the complete unpredictability of the effect of marijuana on different individuals. A small dose taken by a subject may bring about intense intoxication, raving fits or criminal assaults. Another subject can consume large amounts without experiencing any reaction except stupi-

fication. It is this uncertain effect which makes marijuana one of the most dangerous drugs known.

The physician discussed the symptoms of the use of marijuana and added that the most common and noticeable aberration is the uncontrollable fits of idiotic laughter. In addition, the subject loses all sense of space and time. Even in the earliest stages of intoxication the willpower is destroyed and inhibitions and restraints are released; the moral barricades are down and often the

wild, debauchery and sexual results.

Dr. Maulding also discussed the later stages of intoxication on marijuana, in which the most harmful anti-social effects of the drug's action occur.

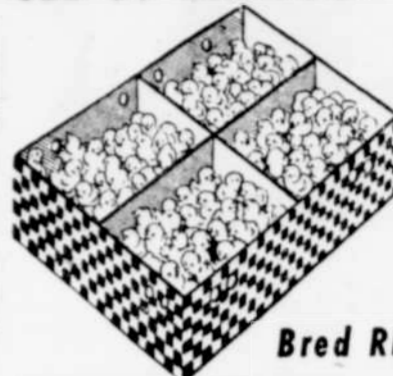

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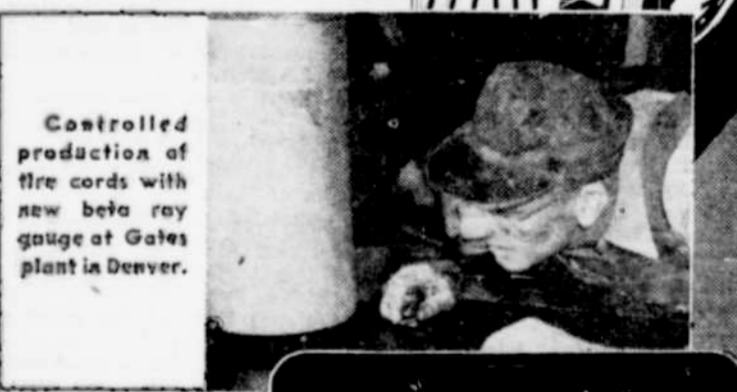
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
