# Campaign of Boy Scouts Planned

Plans for the financial campaign of the Ore-Ida council of the Boy Scouts of America in the Nyssa and Adrian sections were outlined this week by Scout Executive Bill Johnson of Ontario.  
 The kick-off breakfast for Nyssa will be served at 6:30 a. m., March 4. The budget of the Ore-Ida council is used to provide for field services to the units in the district, leadership training, organization and extension, and operation of the council office.  
 Campaign workers of the Owyhee and Adrian area will start a drive next week to raise funds for the Ore-Ida council, according to Boo Thompson of Nyssa, Malheur district finance chairman.  
 The Adrian drive will open with a kick-off breakfast at 9 a. m., Tuesday, February 26 at Bland's cafe in Adrian. Stanley Hill, chairman of the Adrian campaign, announced that Harvey Bennett will captain the Lower Bend-Wade team, Howard Hatch the town team, Frank Pike, Newell Heights, and another to be chosen for Kingman Kolony. Owyhee, with Max Mitchell as chairman, will also begin campaigning Tuesday, February 26. Captains who are choosing team members are Leslie Ballantyne, Arthur Hawkins and Norman Garner.  
**School Boards Facing Problem Of Wage Boost**  
 The school boards of Nyssa, Vale and Ontario met in Ontario Monday night to discuss their common problems, including the question of salaries for another year.  
 The boards agreed salaries should be increased to meet the cost-of-living increases that have occurred during the last year and keep teachers from migrating to western Oregon. **Center Favors Buying Building**  
 The Adrian Farm Bureau voted at a meeting Monday night in favor of the county center buying the Cairo Junction school building. The county center has been considering the purchase for several weeks.  
 During the business meeting Mrs. Jake Borge said the county-wide Farm Bureau "Leap year shin-dig" has been planned for Friday, February 29 at 8 p. m. at the Japanese Community hall near Ontario. Each center is to contribute one or two numbers for the program. Adrian center is to furnish entertainment for the children. The party will be for all Farm Bureau members and anyone interested in the organization.  
 Judge Sewell Stanton of Ontario and Senator Clark Hamilton, Charles Clapp and Mr. Shaw of Weiser were guest speakers.  
 Judge Stanton spoke on the proposed Hell's Canyon dam project and compared government-built power plants with privately-owned plants with reference to ability of construction and cost to consumers of electric energy. He said the waterways belong to all the people, which the government represents.  
 Senator Hamilton stated the proposed dam is the last frontier so far as a power site is concerned. He said the government-owned projects guarantee water rights to all people and all operations must be approved by congress.  
 Mr. Clapp stated the northwest lost big aluminum manufacturing because there was not sufficient power and expressed the belief the interests of the most people could be served best by the government-built Hell's Canyon dam.  
 At the close of the meeting potluck refreshments were enjoyed.

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
