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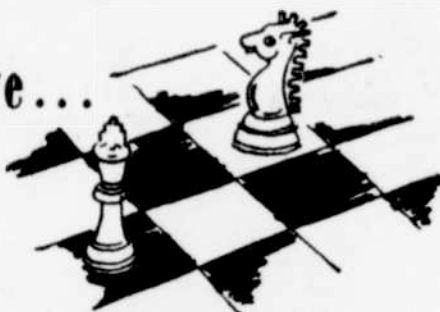

Stringer Named to Hereford Group

KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI, Feb. 28 (Special)—John Stringer of Nyssa, Oregon has been named to membership in the American Hereford association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri.

Two hundred thirty-two Hereford breeders were placed on the association's official roster during January to boost the total membership to an all-time high of 20,061. Members represent every state in the nation.

Cattle Feeding Company Formed

The Oregon Frozen Foods company of Ontario and G. A. "Gib" Masterson, Juntura and Westfall cattleman, have signed an agreement completing organization of the Oregon Feeding company, an Oregon corporation.

The new company, which will specialize in the feeding and fattening of beef cattle on a year-around program, will use the feed from the 15,000 acres of grass and hay land of Mr. Masterson and all of the by-products of the freeze plant. Mr. and Mrs. Masterson will own 50 percent of the stock in the new corporation and the Oregon Frozen Foods company will own 50 percent. Masterson will serve as president and general manager of the new company; Otis Williams, vice president; and Glenn E. Call, secretary-treasurer.

The Oregon Frozen Foods company has purchased the George Carpenter feed yards, adjacent to the Ontario auction yards, announced Neph Grigg, president of the Oregon Frozen Foods company, who said the facilities will be sold to the new Oregon Feeding company.

Masterson has called a special sale at the Ontario auction yards for Friday, February 29, and will sell his entire herd of stock cattle, weaners and calves. The feeding company will then purchase approximately 2000 head of uniform, young steers to graze Masterson's holdings during the grass season, after which they will be taken to Ontario in the fall for finishing and fattening in the yards.

"This may well be the start of one of the best and largest industries in the county and state," said Mr. Grigg. "We have not yet scratched the surface of our potential here in the cattle business with its related possibilities. We, as a community, should first stop the movement of young and unfinished cattle from our county. The next step will be to process it here also, after it has been fattened. This will keep more of the wealth of the area here for the benefit of all."

"This is a move I have looked forward to for a long time," said Mr. Masterson. "I have been putting together a good ranch with this development in mind. I look forward to a fast growing business, and a lot of fun doing it with my new associates."

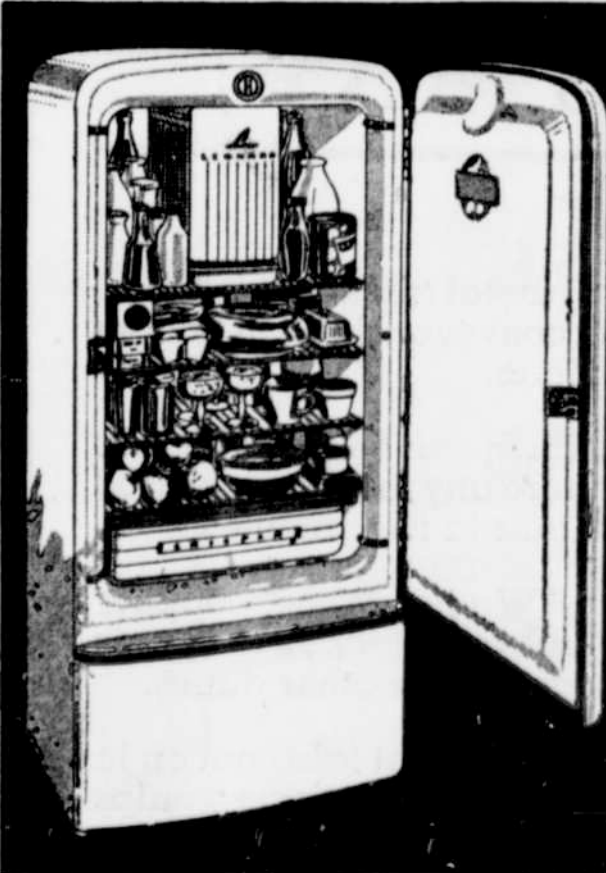
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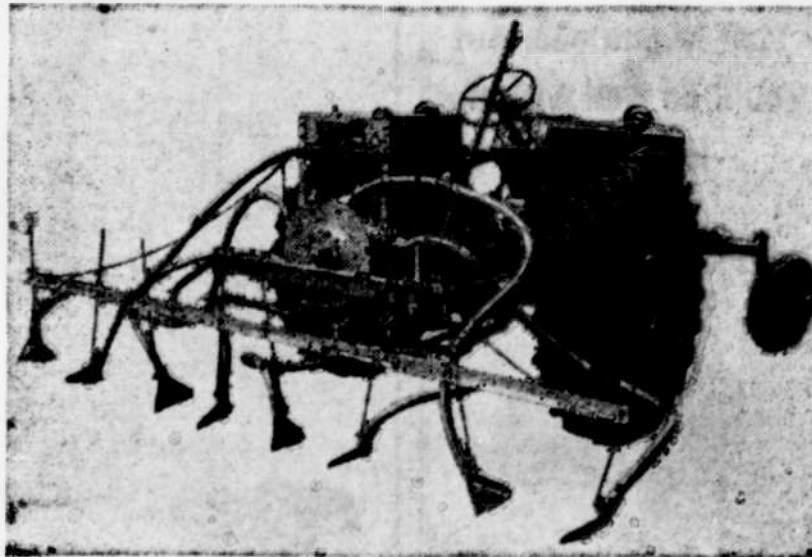
