SUNSET VALLEY, Mar. 20—Alonzo Knowles' right foot was injured Friday when it was caught in the chain of a tractor power drive. Having completed hauling manure on the Lewis Mitchell place and loading the spreader with the tractor, Knowles stepped off the tractor and his right foot caught on the chain, yanking him into the power take-off. Part of the big toe was cut completely off and another toe was broken. The motor was just idling and killed when his foot was caught, or Knowles would have been more seriously injured.
