Varied Books Are Shown This Week

The Malheur county library in Ontario again presents varied titles, both fiction and non-fiction, in its weekly display of new books. The books include personal accounts, practical handbooks and pure narration. Saturday, March 22, is the day they will be ready for circulation.

"A Doctor's Pilgrimage" by Edmund Brasset recounts the author's experience in Nova Scotia.

"Africa, Continent of the Future" by George Haynes outlines information on the people and their countries lying south of the Sahara desert.

Psychological warfare is the new name for propaganda which gets a complete analysis in "Propaganda in War and Crime", edited by Daniel Lerner. Subtitled "Material for American Policy", the book has contributions by men like Elmer Davis, Ellis Zacharias and Harold Lasswell, each contributor being identified in a special section at the beginning of the book.

The on-the-job procedures of the skilled craftsman are shown in "Bricklaying Skill and Practice" by Dabelland Townsend.

The recreation and camp leader will find exceedingly useful the encyclopedia handbook called "The Camp Program Book", which concerns "everything the camper does in camp, planned and unplanned."

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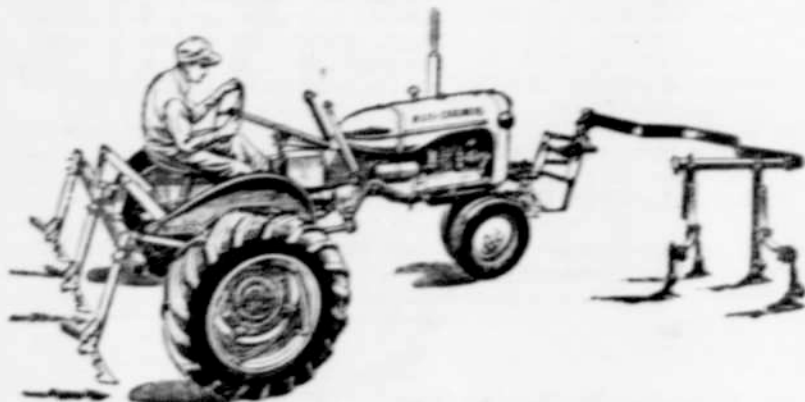
