Feeder Program Set for Station

The 10th annual feeder's day program will be held at the Malheur Experiment station Wednesday, April 16 starting at 12 noon. E. N. Hoffman, superintendent announced today.

Cattle on feed this year have included 10 head of Brahman-Herford crossbreds on test against a like number of Hereford steers. This work is the completion phase of the Squaw Butte experiment station at Burns two years ago. The cattle were bred and raised at the Burns station and were compared on winter and summer range conditions. These trials are the result of a request from the Oregon Cattlemen's association for experimental work involving the two kinds of cattle. Hoffman said.

Other cattle on feed have been on a ration of barley in which the value of an anti-ferment compound has been tested for its value in reducing bloat. A complete report of all tests will be available during the Feeder's day program.

Program speakers will be announced at a later date. The program will start as usual at noon with the free lunch provided by the Ontario chamber of commerce, Hoffman said. The public is invited to attend.
