

Home Week To Be Observed Here

"Today's Home Builds Tomorrow's World" is the slogan for National Home Demonstration week which will be observed throughout the nation April 27 to May 3. County Extension Agent Edna Mae Miller points out that Malheur county women took a big step in building "tomorrow's world" during the past year.

Here are some of the achievements.

Approximately 150 women in Malheur and better dress workshop, these are required for the tailoring workshop to be conducted next year. Topics discussed included fabric and pattern selection, fitting, pattern alterations and new methods of construction. Advantages and disadvantages of remodeling clothes have also

been considered.

Time saving in meal preparation has been stressed, along with economy in food purchasing. These have been covered in projects on low cost meats, main dish meals and home made ready-mixes.

In order to help the women beautify their homes, Malheur county has had approximately 50 women make their own lampshades, others have taken the selection and construction of draperies. About 50 have learned steps in upholstering by making footstools.

In the home management line, approximately 125 women have profited by the demonstration of flower arrangement, simple home repairs and housekeeping shortcuts.

These lessons and demonstrations have been conducted in the home extension unit meetings. Some have been conducted by trained project leaders and others by the county extension agent.

Final weights have been taken on the feed lot cattle with all results to be available at the field day. Cattle on test have included Brahman-Hereford crossbred and Hereford steers.

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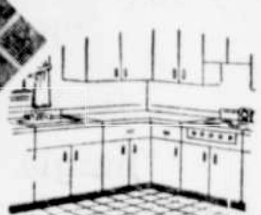
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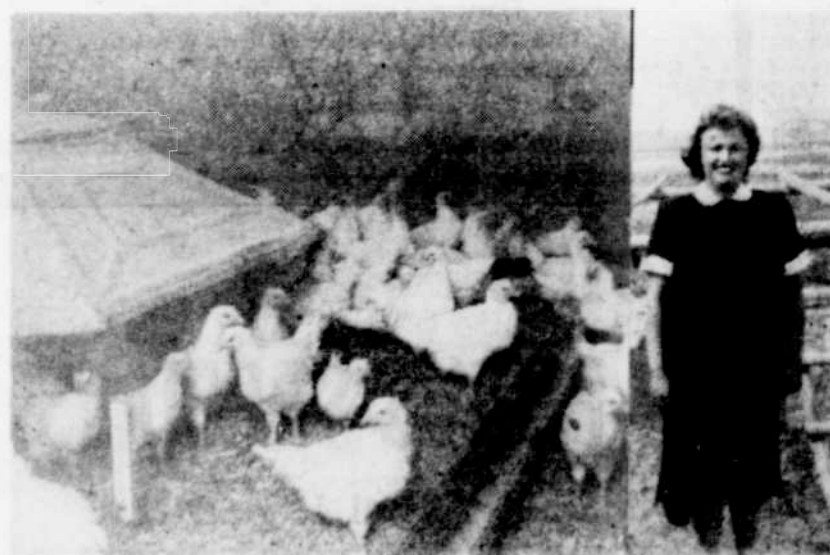


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DEMOLAYS INSTITUTE NEW MEMBER THURSDAY NIGHT

Oregon Vet Dept. Reports On Loans

The first loan made to an ex-serviceman under the Oregon World War II veterans' home and farm loan program more than six years ago has been paid off in full, the Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week.

The department made its first loan in October, 1945, under the act approved by Oregon voters and the state legislature to provide 4 percent loans to returning servicemen for the purchase of homes and farms. The borrower was Earl A. Taw of Portland, an army veteran.

Taw was not an occupant of the property when his loan was paid off, however, as he sold the home on contract in 1949 and moved to Washington. Although he kept the title in his name and continued to make the monthly payments, the 4 percent interest rate he had enjoyed was increased by the department to 5 percent when he sold the property.

While Taw was the first borrower from the veteran's department, his was not the first loan to be completely paid off. There have been 918 others since the program started.

A total of 8925 veterans have borrowed \$33,534,890 to acquire homes under the act, which makes state money available in the amount of 75 percent of the appraised value of the property being purchased. The maximum loan is \$6000.

Eligible to borrow were veterans who resided in Oregon before their World War II military service, as well as veterans who came to Oregon following their discharge and lived here for two years or more, prior to December 31, 1950.

A constitutional amendment to go on the ballot next November would grant loan entitlement to veterans of active service since June 25, 1950. This amendment was referred to the voters by the 1951 legislature.

The veterans' department has sold \$29,000,000 in bonds to obtain funds for lending purposes. The average interest rate being paid on the bonds is 1.47 percent. Because of the favorable difference between this cost and the 4 percent earnings from the loans, the department has been able to pay the cost of administering the program and the interest on the bonds, and maintain a surplus which

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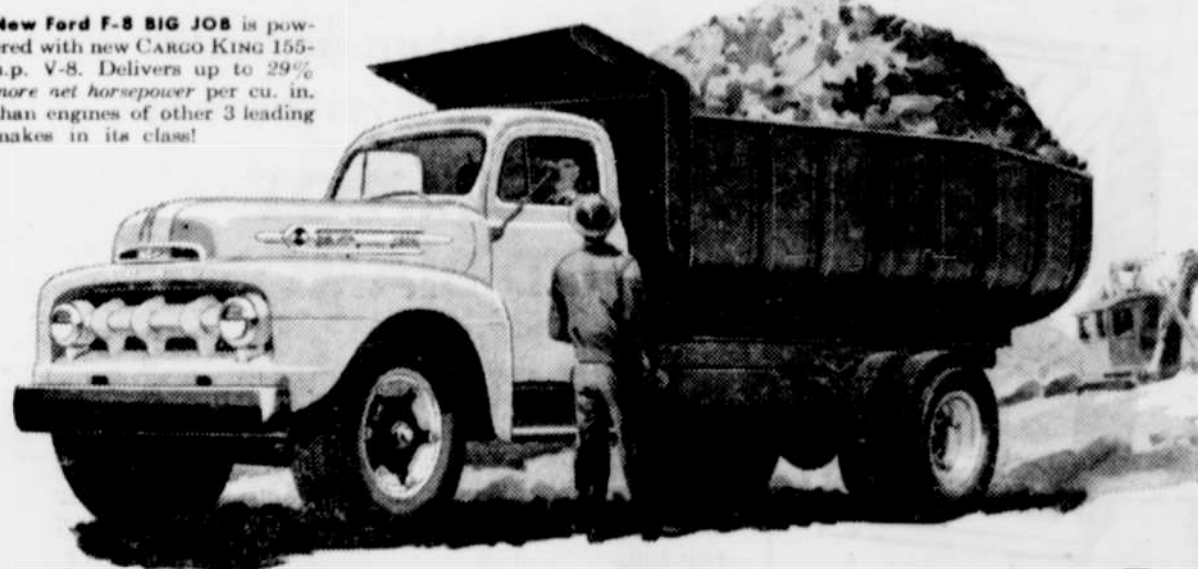
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
