5 Years Ago April 17, 1947

John Koopman, Vale, former deputy sheriff has been appointed Malheur county assessor, succeeding Ed Hendrix, resigned. — Committee chairmen for the Nyssa school Junior-Senior banquet and prom set for April 23 are Lois Bybee, Mary Mary Lou Schenk, Joyce Bair, Bernice Bowen, Louise Lewis and Tom Bates. — Rodger S. Anderson of Apple Valley has opened the feed mill formerly operated by P. M. Warren on South First St. — Mrs. Jean Fletcher and daughter, Mrs. Catherine McCrea and Marjorie Jean left for Seattle. Mrs. McCrea and daughter were scheduled to sail from Seattle to Anchorage, Alaska to make their home. — 16,000 rain-bow trout, averaging five inches in length were planted in the Owyhee river the past few days by the state

game commission and Malheur Game League. — A committee, W. E. Schireman, Luray Trabert and Ormond Thomas, has been selected by the Masonic lodge to investigate the feasibility of instituting a De-Molay Chapter in Nyssa. — A new pump capable of delivering 100 gallons of water per minute was placed in operation for watering the city park and a new power mower was delivered for use in the park.

10 Years Ago April 16, 1942

The P. S. A. of Malheur County received authority from Washington, D. C. to purchase the Mrs. Emma Quinby property along Snake River for establishment of a semi-permanent farm labor camp. A budget of approximately \$100,000 has been approved for labor shelters for 300 families and utility building. — Organization of a state

15 Years Ago April 15, 1937

On April 9, 1952, the United States District Court for the Southern District of New York entered a final judgment, with the consent of all parties, which ended four years of litigation between Harry Ferguson, Inc. and Ford Motor Company and others. It was ordered and adjudged that:

1. The sum of \$9,250,000 shall be paid to Harry Ferguson, Inc. as royalties on Patents Nos. 1,916,945; 2,118,180; 2,223,002 and 2,436,257.
2. Ford Motor Company shall not manufacture, after December 31, 1952, such tractors, and Dearborn Motors Corporation shall not sell any such tractors manufactured after December 31, 1952, as have
 - (a) a pump having a valve on its suction side, as for example in the present Ford 8N tractor, arranged to be automatically controlled in accordance with the draft of an implement, or
 - (b) a pump for a hydraulically operated draft control system for implement control and a power take-off shaft both driven by the lay shaft of the transmission, as for example in the present Ford 8N tractor, or
 - (c) a coupling mechanism on the upper portion of the center housing, of the form employed in Ford 8N tractors manufactured prior to November 22, 1949; and Ford Motor Company and Dearborn Motors Corporation must affix a notice on any long coupling pins, manufactured by them, to the effect that the pin is sold only for replacement on 8N

tractors made by Ford prior to November 22, 1949. This notice will continue to be affixed until October 25, 1966.

3. The Ford Motor Company and Dearborn Motors Corporation shall have a period of time, expiring not later than December 31, 1952 in which to make these changes.
4. All other claims and counter claims are dismissed and withdrawn on the merits.

A copy of the consent judgment is available to anyone interested in reading it.

This settlement between Harry Ferguson, Inc. and The Ford Motor Company resolves the issues. The inventions in their entirety with which this action was concerned will be found only in the Ferguson Tractor and in the Ferguson System in the future.

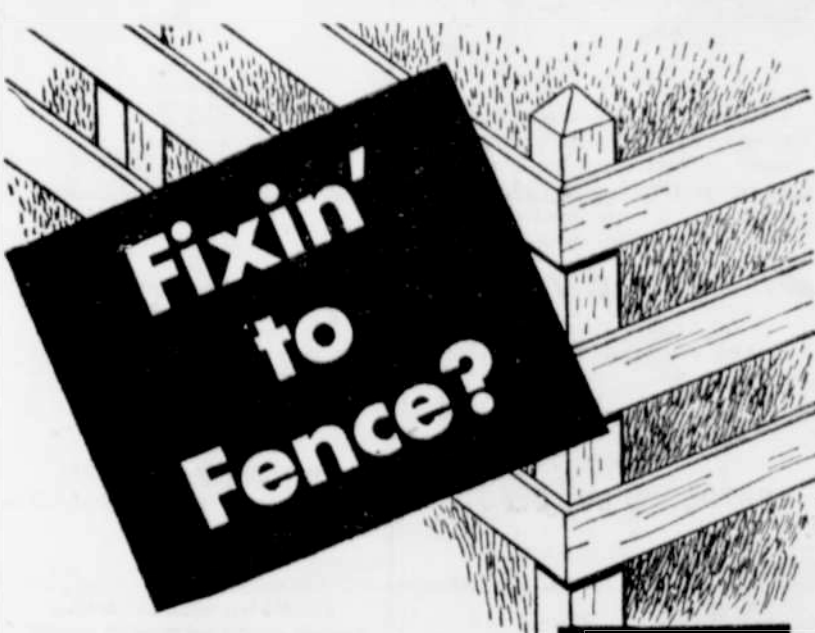
