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More Books Listed For. Co. Library

A variety of titles will be ready for circulation at the Malheur county library in Ontario on Saturday. They include a book regarding the current problem of river floods; one of seasonal timeliness; a dancer's autobiography; and serious, mystery, western, and science fiction.

A book of particular current interest, considering the present spring floods along the Missouri river and the continuing discussions about valley authorities, is "The Dammed Missouri Valley" by Richard G. Baumhoff. This work is a journalistic study of the area through which the Missouri and its tributaries flow, and presents both sides of the argument on the proposed Missouri Valley Authority.

"North With the Spring" is a naturalist's story of how he started from the Everglades in the spring and followed the season northward in twenty-three states over 17,000 miles. Edwin Way Teale describes islands, trees, snakes, butterflies, and various phenomena that herald the awakening of the natural world after winter.

"The Dark Moment" by Ann Bridge is a novelized version of the remaking of modern Turkey, told through the experiences of two young women.

"Dance to the Piper" is Agnes De Mille's story of her struggle for success in ballet, surmounting obstacles in the way of her training. A niece of the Hollywood producer, she is the choreographer of "Oklahoma!" and "Carousel."

A new Perry Mason mystery novel by a prolific writer is "The Case of the Angry Mourner" by Erle Stanley Gardner. The interest in this type of writing may well extend to "Queen's Quorum" by Ellety Queen, described in its subtitle as "a history of the detective-crime short story as revealed by the 106 most important books published in this field since 1845."

A novel related in stream of consciousness style and telling the story of a Southern family's degeneration is a first novel by William Styron called "Lie Down in Darkness."

A science fiction story about the inhabitants of a strange planet who try to prevent men from leaving earth is John MacDonald's "Wine of the Dreamers."

"The Unquiet Night" by Albrecht

Goes is the story of an army chaplain's search for answers to human puzzles and his attempt to comfort spiritually a condemned young deserter. The book is translated from the German.

The story of how John Perez, a Pawnee half-breed, won recognition in the face of prejudice, to satisfy his fierce longing "to belong, by force of achievement, to the white race of his father" is "Red Blizzard" by Clay Fisher.

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Traffic Accidents Claim 25 Lives

Oregon traffic accidents claimed 25 lives last month, Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry reported Friday. The March count brought the toll for 1952 to 74, one more than was recorded last year at the same time.

While the final count for the three month period is not much above that of last year, the secretary warned that February and March deaths were considerably higher than usual. Twenty-nine died in February accidents, the highest count for that month since 1948.

Traffic accidents, injuries and deaths usually begin climbing in April or May, Newberry said, and reach a peak during July, August and September, coinciding with heavy summer vacation travel. With deaths this year already on the increase, the secretary said the state may have its worst accident experience since the early post-war years.

"The only way to prevent this," he concluded, "is for every driver to exercise common sense judgment, obey traffic laws, and practice common courtesy on the highway."
