A Monument To Humanity

Next Tuesday is Hospital Day at the Malheur Memorial hospital where open house will be held and the general public is invited to inspect one of the most outstanding institutions of its kind in the northwest.

This hospital is indeed a monument to humanity because of the manner in which it was constructed with private funds contributed by residents of this and neighboring communities, because of the business-like way in which the hospital has been operated since the day it opened and because of the almost unbelievable ability of the hospital staff and the doctors to handle emergencies such as the polio epidemic last summer and fall.

It has filled a need in this community to keep faith with the hundreds of generous-hearted people who gave money and the small groups like the Founders Service organization and the Hospital auxiliary. Individuals in these two, and other organizations, have supplied materials and services without fanfare and for no remuneration only their satisfaction in knowing that the ill in health can be properly cared for.

Insofar as this vast area known as the Snake river valley is concerned, the Malheur Memorial hospital has pioneered many new policies, such as bringing specialists of all kinds from the cities to the patients in need of special attention.

Knowing that the money contributed for the original construction has brought returns far greater than monetary interest on their investments, the people of Malheur and adjacent counties continued to dig into their pockets for additional funds when last year's polio emergency existed. The hospital board and Manager John O'Toole have used those special contributions wisely to purchase new equipment that will mean better care and more rapid recovery for the afflicted.

If strangers ask you, "What kind of a community is this?" tell them to inspect and investigate the Malheur Memorial hospital. Their findings will adequately answer a million questions.

William T. Peary, executive secretary of the board of church extension of Indianapolis, Ind., will be honored at a baked chicken dinner given by members and friends of the First Christian church of Nyssa, Tuesday evening of next week at 7:30.

He represents a church extension department of the national organization of the Christian churches. For 11 years he was its treasurer and for more than 20 years he has seen this organization grow until it now has more than \$4 million which it has accumulated in the past 26 years.

Blue prints for the native stone structure now being built at Fifth and Ninth in Nyssa were furnished by the national architect of the board of church extension. In the recent month, this organization has furnished construction money on a long-time loan with low interest rate to the Nyssa church.

In the 26 years of the life of the board of church extension, according to Peary, the national organization has never had to foreclose on a loan granted to a local church. In his address Tuesday night, he will acquaint members with plans of the board.
