Marion and Betty Boston visited with their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Boston over week-end. The girls returned to Nampa Monday morning.

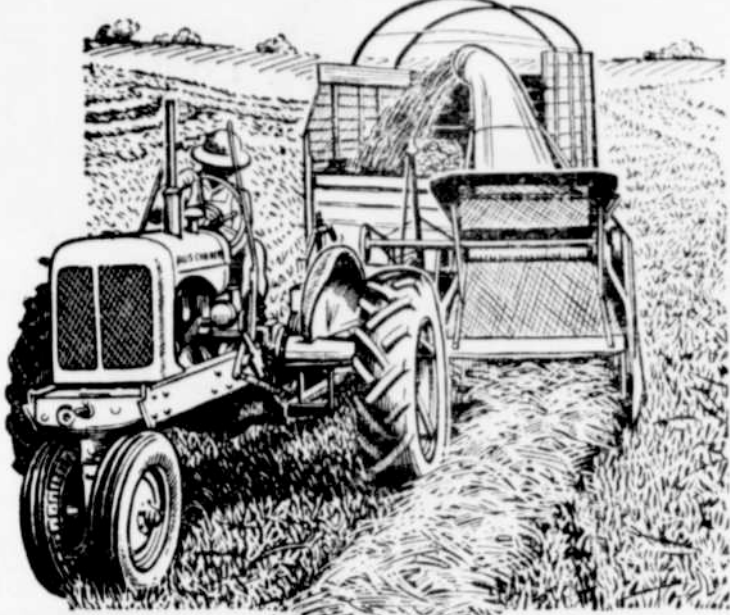
Word has been received from Gene Boston that he has arrived in England.
