Milk Utilization
Shifts Noted
In OSC Circular

Changes in milk utilization in the Portland milkshed between 1940 and 1950 have been analyzed by an Oregon State college research assistant and the results published as experiment station circular of information 512.

Gordon A. Rowe, former cooperative employee of the U. S. department of agriculture and the OSC agricultural economics department, reports in the publication that population has outdistanced milk production in the west. He also notes that the sale of a greater proportion of fluid milk and ice cream has resulted in a shift from production of butter, cheese and evaporated milk.

He concludes that manufacturing plants with in the Portland area will have to obtain milk from outside sources to maintain a full operating schedule.

Bright Future
Seen For Youth
On Dairy Farm

As a June dairy month note, young men interested in agriculture might well afford to consider dairying as a vocation which will challenge their abilities, believes H. P. Ewalt, Oregon State college extension dairy specialist.

The business offers both steady income and a bright future. The steady population increase in the Pacific coast states, says Ewalt, spells an increasing demand for more milk, especially for fluid use. This latter use is in the most lucrative position. If Oregon dairymen fail to supply this milk, the specialist warns, dairymen outside the state will likely take over the market.

How long can an increased production per cow help to offset the decrease in cow numbers being milked in Oregon? June milk production a year ago was 3 percent less than for June 1950.

Bottle and can milk usage, meanwhile, is on the increase and without a hike in total production, this milk must come from herds which formerly supplied manufacturing milk and have now qualified for grade A. Even though there is a temporary lack of active interest in increasing Oregon's dairy cow numbers, the state is still out in front with high individual production records and high herd production averages.

Ewalt says C. J. Berning, M. An-

gel, holds a national Holstein butterfat production record. M. C. Fleming, Troutdale, has a similar national record for Guernseys. Oregon Brown Swiss are out in front with high records at the Albert Meier farm, Beaverton, where a new class leader was recently announced. Jerseys continue to lead national records made at the Ralph Cope farm at Langlois. Ayrshires are also represented in Oregon with a number of good producing herds.

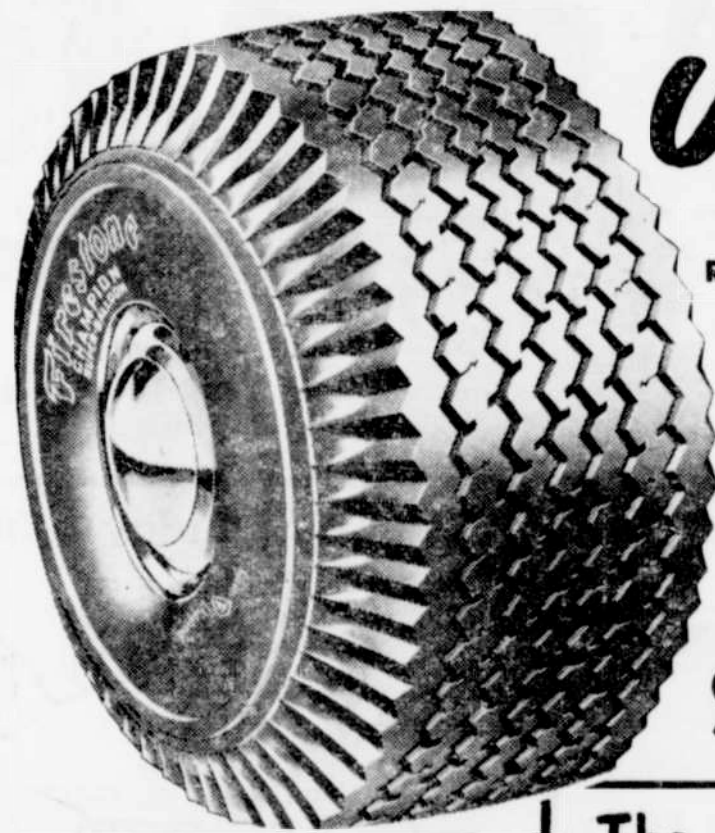

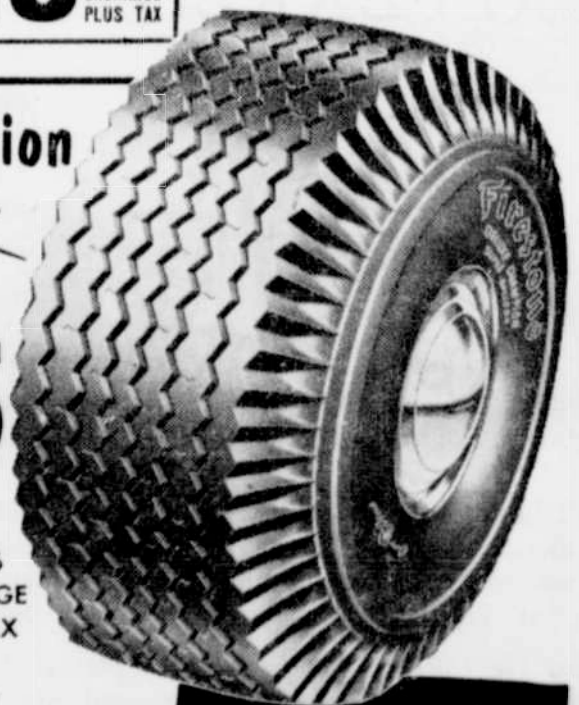

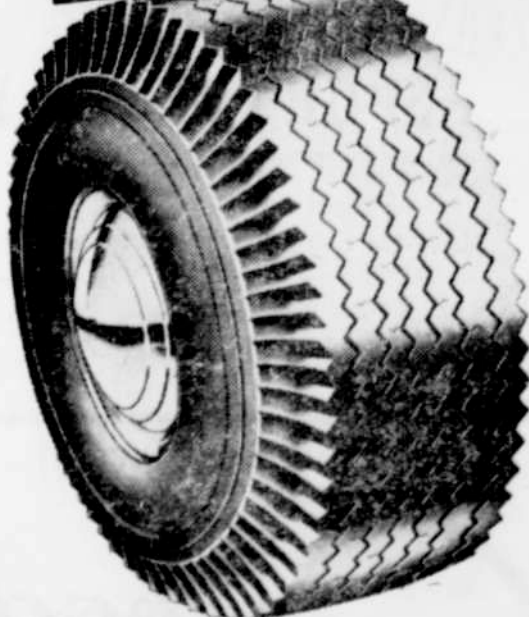
