Fawn Possession Case Dismissed After Hearing

Charges of possession of a game animal against Dean Everett Fife were dismissed this week by Justice of the Peace Don M. Graham following a hearing last Wednesday.

According to the court records the defendant was returning to Nyssa on June 11 from a trip to western Oregon and while travelling on the Santiam highway near Sisters, Oregon an automobile in front of him struck and killed a mother deer. A small fawn with the doe was unharmed, Fife told the court. After some deliberation, he picked up the fawn to take it home and write a letter to the game commission.

Fife stated that he was advised by the game commission to keep the fawn until a field agent could transfer it to a game farm.

On June 23 Harold D. Smith, a state police officer, called at the Fife home, picked up the fawn and gave Fife a summons to appear in the justice court. Fife further told the court that he had received another letter from the state game commission in which he was instructed to hold the fawn until a field agent arrived to take it over.

During the morning of June 25 a Mr. Clark, who told the Fife's he was from the state game commission and on his way to Jordan Valley and that he had called to pick up the fawn. When informed that Officer Smith had picked up the animal on the previous Monday, he thanked Mr. Fife and went away, the court record stated.

In dismissing the case, Judge Graham stated, "The court believes that Dean Everett Fife acted in good faith in doing what he did on June 11, 1952, therefore, it is ordered and adjudged that the case against Dean Everett Fife be dismissed, and the court record entered accordingly."

Four-Car Crash Brings Injuries To Four People

Two weeks about midnight last Saturday involving four vehicles and occurring within a few minutes of each other, resulted in critical injuries to at least one man and several hundred dollars property damage. The smashups took place just north of Nyssa on the highway to Ontario.

Umberto Herrera, 37, is still listed as critical in the Malheur Memorial hospital, and Emanuel Garcia, driver of one of the cars, is reported to be recovering from serious injuries. Two other occupants of Garcia's car were treated at the Ontario hospital and their conditions are reported less serious than those hospitalized here. State police were unable to provide their names.

According to reports, both accidents resulted from a car parked on the highway after its lighting system failed. Officials said that Leonard H. Cleaver had been traveling north and had stopped to repair the lights, but neglected to pull off the highway. A second car driven by C. K. Sample, route 2, Parma, came up behind the parked vehicle hitting it a glancing blow from the rear. The impact threw the Cleaver car into a ditch at the right side of the road and the Sample car into the barrow pit on the other side.

Wagoner Motor Co.'s wrecker was called and Charles Landreth, the driver of the wrecker, was waiting until state police completed their investigation. Although the wrecker's signal lights were operating, the car driven by Garcia and occupied by three other men, came from the south and crashed into the back of the wrecker.

The terrific impact cut through the Garcia car and smashed the instrument panel into the driver and both in the cab of the wrecker, were "shaken up" by the impact, but not seriously injured.

Although the wrecker showed only minor scratches, damage to the vehicle was estimated at \$300, the Garcia car was a total loss and the two other cars were badly damaged.

Cleaver appeared before Justice of the Peace Don Graham Monday and was fined \$10 and \$4.50 court costs after pleading guilty to charges of parking on a highway. Sample paid a fine of \$3 and \$4.50 costs in the same court for driving with an expired operator's license.
