Nursing Group Formed Here To Help Combat Polio

Miss Della Morgan, field representative of the American Red Cross, met Wednesday with county Red Cross and medical personnel in the effort to form a local polio nursing committee in the interests of Malheur Memorial hospital, to function under the joint auspices of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and the Red Cross.

Those attending the organizational meeting, held at the hospital Wednesday night, were Mrs. Colleen Wilks, RN, Vale, vice chairman Malheur Red Cross chapter disaster nursing committee, chairman; Mrs. Esther S. McCormick, RN, Nyssa hospital; Mrs. E. A. Liming, RN, Nyssa, Malheur chapter, Infantile Paralysis foundation; Sister Raphael, RN, Ontario hospital, and Mrs. Edan Ferris, Vale, county public health nurse.

Others present included Clyde Snider, Nyssa, chairman county paralysis foundation; Max S. Taggart, county chairman, Red Cross; John O'Toole, hospital superintendent, and R. D. Fleissner, physiotherapist.

The committee discussed the problem of the over-burdened nursing staff of the Nyssa hospital, and will meet again Thursday night to continue its studies.

A request was also voiced by the committee for any registered nurse, or licensed practical nurse, to make immediate contact with Liming, Nyssa 226-J.

ly as repairs can be made. Although not being able to estimate the cost of putting it into condition, Burton predicted that it would take a month or more and the plant should be in operation by late summer.

In reviewing the condition revolving about the local sewage plant, Burton further stated that it has been used but little since its construction in 1939. Its usage was discontinued because chain belts on the sludge collector were not replaceable. A further lack was the absence of a drying bed for digested sludge and the present disrepair of the chlorinator.

Disturbed over the pressure being exerted by the Sanitary Authority, Burton pointed the finger at other cities along the Snake river and several of its tributaries that are guilty of polluting their waters without any apparent threat of abatement.

These include Caldwell, Parma, Payette, Weiser, Vale and Ontario, with an estimated population of 25,000.

As Burton puts it: "When the Nyssa sewage disposal plant is put in operation, it isn't going to help the over-all pollution condition of Snake river if all these other towns are allowed to continue to dump their entire sewage into it."

The population of Nyssa is 2,525.
